Fancy-color diamonds are natural, rare and truly exotic gem of the earth. Diamonds in hues of yellow, red, pink, blue, and green range in intensity from faint to vivid and generally the more saturated the color, the higher the value. In fact, diamonds sparkling with intense color are rare and may be priced higher than a colorless diamond of equal size. Because fancy-color diamonds are very desirable, color is sometimes introduced in a laboratory. These are correctly called *color-treated diamonds*. When purchasing a fancy-color diamond, the shopper should ask if any enhancements or treatments were used to improve its color and/or clarity.

In mineralogy, **diamond** (from the ancient Greek ἀδάμας – adámas "unbreakable") is an allotrope of carbon, where the carbon atoms are arranged in a variation of the face-centered cubic crystal structure called a diamond lattice. Diamond is less stable than graphite, but the conversion rate from diamond to graphite is negligible at ambient conditions. Diamond is renowned as a material with superlative physical qualities, most of which originate from the strong covalent bonding between its atoms. In particular, diamond has the highest hardness and thermal conductivity of any bulk material. Those properties determine the major industrial application of diamond in cutting and polishing tools

## APRIL IS NOT YOUR TYPICAL FIELD TRIP!

- WHEN:** Saturday, April 17 – Sunday April 18, 2010
- ON THIS DAY IN HISTORY:** Historic Ride of Paul Revere
- WHERE:** Sheideck, CA on Reyes Creek
- WHAT:** Fossil Shells in the creek, “Purple Ozena” agate (named by an Orcutt Rock Hound!) and other material in the dry river bed. Suitable for spheres.
- MEET:** 11:00 A.M. Saturday at the dry River Bed after the turn off Lockwood Valley Road. Sunday AM trip departs at 08:30.
- TOOLS:** Rock Picks, Bucket, Baggies for shell material, maybe a shovel to dig the soft sand. Not hard-rock mining.
- CAMPING:** Reyes Creek Campground, County, \$5.00 night, 1<sup>st</sup> come, no reservations.
- DESCRIPTION:** This field trip will be walking and searching for material in the dry river bed (I cannot tell you the name of the river, tragically!) and in Reyes Creek for anything interesting. Saturday we will walk the river bed. Saturday night the Reyes Creek Bar and Grill – adjacent to the campground - has live music and dancing! It is a rustic place with \$3.00 beer. Owners are Tony and Ale, Their number is (661) 766-2521 if you have questions about the access. Nice folks. There are a few permanent residents in the little town of Scheideck right there. We checked it out. It is beautiful, trees, creek side sites, a couple of large open sites for groups, some fire pits and pit toilets. So bring RVs, tents cars, pickups whatever and have a fun weekend. Sunday morning, check out the fossils in the creek.

**HOW TO GET THERE:** From the Orange County area, take I 5 North. Exit at Frazier Mountain Park Road, number 205 and drive about 7 miles. Turn left onto Lockwood Valley Road (pass Lake of the Woods). In about 24 miles, you will see a sign for Reyes Creek Camp, on Forest Rout 7N11. The sign is square on the left hand side. Turn left; go to the dry river bed, park on either side of the river and rock hound! There will be a Searcher sign at the turn-off. It is close. Continue across the river to the Reyes Creek Camp, just past the Bar and Grill.

Note the late start time on Saturday

This is a family oriented trip and will be a lot of fun. All roads are paved, walking is easy for the smaller kids and me! The creek is rocky and over hung with trees, very picturesque. Wes Lingerfeldt of the Orcutt Minerals, said he has gotten good sphere material and fossils her. "C U AT THE RIVER"

## **Searchers Long Range Field Trip, July 2010**

We are planning a long range field trip this summer. It will go up the coast of northern California, and southern Oregon. During this part we will collect at Little Panoche rd near Fresno (agates and jaspers), the Van Duzen River (agate), and Whisky Run near Coos Bay (beach agate). We will then turn inland, and collect at the Prineville area and Richardson Ranch (thunder eggs, moss agate) before heading south to the Spectrum sunstone mine (sunstones). From there we will spend several days at Glass Buttes (obsidian), followed by several days near Graveyard Point.(plume agate, picture jasper). Heading south we will collect at Topaz Mountain (topaz), and then spend several days at the Trilobite Jam ([www.trilobitejam.com](http://www.trilobitejam.com)) near Delta Utah collecting trilobites. From here to southern Utah to collect at Brianhead (agate), and then maybe stop at Holt Canyon (agate and jasper) on the way home.

If this sounds like a big trip it is, currently it looks to be 3 weeks long. Long range trips run differently than our usual weekend trips. You will need to be pretty self sufficient. Not everyone goes to all parts of the trip. Some go to just the sections of the trip that interest them. Some areas, especially the coastal part I plan to spend in motels and the big RVs may be planning on joining us at the Spectrum sunstone mine (to avoid some of the curvy roads along the coast) and continuing from there, so at the moment I am not aware of people camping during the coastal part. As more people decide to go it may well be possible to find others to camp with during this portion of the trip. In theory you may need to be prepared to camp alone or motel it yourself. At some of the sites we expect everyone to be camping, as there is not always convenient motels around. We will not be formally planning potlucks; however we may very well decide to do some impromptu potlucks depending on the situation.

This trip will give us a chance to collect in some areas that we normally can't access, and as I see it the biggest problem may be to be discriminating so that the truck doesn't fill up with rocks too early in the trip.

Several of the collecting sites are fee digs. The Spectrum Sunstone Mine ([www.highdesertgemsandminerals.com/html/spectrum\\_sunstone\\_mines.html](http://www.highdesertgemsandminerals.com/html/spectrum_sunstone_mines.html)) is a fee dig, with a variety of choices, free digging, buying piles of high grade ore(\$150-\$200/pile), and actual renting of the mine conveyor by the hour (\$200/hr), they claim to process 6 tons of ore in an hour, and you keep what is found. The Richardson's Rock Ranch ([www.richardsonrockranch.com](http://www.richardsonrockranch.com)) is a fee dig, where you buy the material you have collected for \$1 /lb. They have several sites they can give you access to. The Trilobite

Jam ([www.trilobitejam.com](http://www.trilobitejam.com)) is a fee dig, lasting 4 days, including some lectures, digging contests, and a Buffalo feed on Sat night. The Trilobite Jam costs \$250, although early registration (until Apr 1) is \$200.

**NOTE: The early registration fee reduction has been extended for Searchers until April 30th!**

The plans are still completely tentative at this point, but you can see the tentative schedule above. If you think you may be interested in some or all of this trip please email me, Steve Duncan, ([wsd@iteris.com](mailto:wsd@iteris.com)), and let me know what your plans might be. Or if you have any questions let me know. Needless to say, nearer to the actual trip we will try to firm up most of the details

## TALE OF A TRILOBITE

Imagine a sunny day 500 million years ago on the continental shelf off Laurentia. The continent that would ultimately become North America was called Laurentia back in Cambrian times. So you are nestling down in the soft sand occasionally popping up to see all your friends and family happily feeding. Littering the shelf as usual are many shed exoskeletons from trilobites of various sizes. Actually, your current skeleton is starting to feel a little snug and you are planning on shedding it this summer. All of the other ocean creatures like sponges, snails, and jellyfish are also there happily enjoying this beautiful underwater Cambrian day.

Then...the silt begins to churn up making the water cloudy and the ground begins to shake. You cannot see. Before you can react sand and rock pour down over you burying you and your other trilobite friends. You try to wiggle to get out, like that one time when you barely escaped a similar underwater landslide, but this time you are trapped. You cannot move enough to feed yourself and you eventually die amongst the others.

So you lay there for millions of years as more sediment piles on top of you, completely squashing your body into a flattened representation of its former self. All of your soft tissue eventually decays into the silt and over time the silt turns to sedimentary shale rock. Your skeleton eventually loses all of its organic matter being replaced by minerals leached out of the surrounding rock. The continent of Laurentia moves about with sections submerging and resurfacing several times. Over time your final shale bed gets uplifted completely above the water line <gosh its dry>. The many earthquakes and volcanism present in Laurentia and later California push the formerly submerged shale upward to form the end of the Marble mountains. The strata eventually becomes tilted by about 45 degrees to the ground. There, uplifted in the now dry California desert, our trilobite friend lay awaiting eternity.



One day millions of years later there is a pounding that echoes thru the rock surrounding you. Some of the rock around you fractures and you can feel the pressure on your fossilized body decreasing. Suddenly, you feel like you are being moved. It is as if your bed of shale has been broken into a large slab <oh gosh what will happen next>. More pounding occurs, this time the vibrations ring through your whole body. The shale around you begins to crack <is this the final end you wonder>, then in an instant you are blinded by an extremely bright light, brighter than anything you have ever seen before in 500 million years. There is no water and the air around you is wispy, much thinner than it used to be and has an odd smell to it that reminds you of an underwater volcanic

vent. As you look up towards the light you see a giant creature holding your fossilized body, it is soft like a jelly fish, but has several holes in it with stuff growing out of the top. One hole opens and closes causing pressures on your body that sort of tickles. Is this some sort of giant jellyfish you wonder? Is it going to eat me?

Instead, this creature cares for your corpse, cleaning the dirt off of it and brushing away the salts that grew into the shale. The creature then props you up on a stand and shines a light in your face constantly. Other creatures like your captor come by and look at you. As you glance around you see other trilobite fossils just like yourself, also prepared and on stands. They do not say much, but you wonder if they have a similar story about how they got here. You also wonder if someday you will make it back to your old shale bed.
