The annual fall business meeting of the California Federation of Mineral Societies was held in Visalia, in the great California Bread Basket, the weekend of November 9-11. About 90 delegates attended - not enough for a total of 146 clubs! A highlight of the business meeting was the election of officers for calendar 2001. Bob Stultz from the Conejo Club was elected as our new President.

Reports given by the heads of the many standing committees documented the good work being done by our Federation in areas like youth activities, education, field trips, scholarships, and recognition of clubs and individual members for their skills, accomplishments, or team efforts. In spite of all that good effort, CFMS clubs and memberships continue to decline (except ours!) Lets be sure to look at what makes us work well and hold on to it!

Last year, the focus was on insurance matters. That appears to have been competently addressed with a policy that now that gives each club far better protection for field trips and club rock shops. A recent brochure by Fred Ott summarizes this important benefit of CFMS affiliation. The Federation seems to be healthy, active and financially stable.

This year's attention initially focused on encouraging clubs to take on sponsorship of the Federation's annual show for 2002, 2003 and 2004. It is really important to spread the wealth of experience and ability around. There are a myriad of folks in the CFMS who will willingly help any club with specific guidelines for the "big shew".

Paso Robles is already well underway with arrangements for the Federation show in 2001. Several clubs stepped forward during the session to begin active consideration of future shows. The Valley Prospectors presented a check for over \$7500 as a 50/50 split of the profits from the August 2000 CFMS show in Riverside. Dry camping on the fairgrounds is a reasonable \$5 per night, \$10 for water and power.

One new project that sounds interesting is the formation of a new effort on publicity. CFMS started the project to help member clubs publicize their activities and attract new members. The initial meeting of the ad-hoc committee at Visalia developed a mission statement, goals for the next year, and a list of project ideas. These will be distributed to key officers in each of the Federation's 146 clubs during the next year.

The CFMS plans at least three field trips this next year (my particular interest). Since the show is at Paso Robles, I understand a trip back tothe ever popular Stone Canyon, less than 50 miles away may be anticipated. It would make a wonderful club field trip to Stone Canyon for that fab jasper and on to the P.R. show. I know I will be going, in addition to joining Burson's Binge on the extended trip. Put then both on your calendar and start filling the old piggy banks now. Maybe we can even anticipate a Searcher Case in it? Get busier, Shopsters.

The food was terrific at the banquet, for once, and it's always a pleasure to see friends again.

I know I have enjoyed my year as CFMS Director and wish Jim Perlowin even more fun. I know he will be a great one!

LEAVE NO TRACE/TREAD LIGHTLY

"Leave No Trace!" and "Tread Lightly!" are 2 programs developed by the National Forest Service as guidelines for users of public lands.
"Leave No Trace!" is an outdoor user's ethic that promotes more of an attitude and awareness than adherence to rules and regulations. "Tread Lightly!" is to encourage recreationists to be responsible during off-highway travel. These programs are just different ways of stating a number of articles of the American Federation Code of Ethics and therefore should be the practice of all rockhounds when using public and private lands. The following are selected points from each program to be attentive to and use when we are hiking, camping, driving and rockhounding.

"Leave No Trace!" was developed for back country users, but is applicable to all public land uses. It is a set of guidelines that will help lessen impact on the environment and on others. The principles of "Leave No Trace!" are:

Plan ahead and prepare.

Camp and travel on durable surfaces.

Pack It In, Pack It Out.

Minimize use and impact of fire.

Camping, off-highway travel, fires and garbage/litter removal are major concerns. When selecting a campsite choose one that is established or designated. Leave your site clean to increase the likelihood that others will use it. Leave the site cleaner than you found it, even if it means packing out someone else's trash. Use existing campfire rings to lessen the overall impact.

The USFS, and the BLM are not garbage removal services, therefore always pack out your trash and garbage. All food scraps and garbage should be packed out. They decompose slowly and are not natural to the environment. Burning or burying food causes problems. Keep food waste from animals to help prevent them from becoming habituated to humans as a source of food and becoming a nuisance around camp. Food waste also attracts and encourages non-native species.

"Tread Lightly!" began as a USFS program in the mid-1980's. Its goal was to educate the public on protecting public lands by practicing low-impact principles, applicable to all forms of recreational activity. The basic principles of the "Tread Lightly!" pledge are:

Travel only where permitted.
Respect the rights of others.
Educate yourself.
Avoid streams, meadows, wildlife areas, etc.
Drive and travel responsibly.

"Tread Lightly!" require four things: preparation, common sense, courtesy and respect for the environment. Before you head out on your next rockhounding trip or other off-highway adventure, a little preparation can make your life easier and safer. Planning for the unexpected will make your trip enjoyable rather than a disaster. Travel with a group of 2 or more vehicles to enable you to get out if you have mechanical problems, an accident or illness. A CB or the new FM walkie-talkies are valuable tools. Keeping in touch with others in your party is essential, and can alert them of hazards or if you are having a problem. Stay on designated roads—don't make your own short cuts. Respect fenced areas and No Trespassing signs. Leave gates as they are found. Remember — Enjoy don't destroy. Defaced roads and trails caused by irresponsible people are often closed tomorrow. Be considerate of others on the road and in camping areas. Keep noise and dust down. Be cheerful and pleasant — be a rockhound goodwill ambassador.


