LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM

Long-time Searcher member, Clare Gagnon, was our July speaker discussing faceting and explaining the machinery and the stones used for faceting. As a mentor for the Faceter's Guild of Southern California (FGSC), Clare encourages new club membership as a great way to get faceting guidance from an experienced cutter and to take advantage of club equipment.

Clare uses a faceting machine made by the Jarvi Tool Company in Anaheim, California, which manufactures the most complete line of gem cutting equipment in the world. The fundamental pieces of a faceting machine are the staff, quill and lap. The quill pivots on the staff with a vertical angle that can be set to the nearest tenth of a degree and also has 90 rotational positions making it remarkably accurate. This machine can be adjusted once, changed to new settings, then returned accurately to the original settings allowing it very important repeatability. The variable speed motor allows flexibility in workmanship. The lap provides the cutting power. A coarse 360 grit lap might be used for rough cutting and preliminary cutting, and a 1200 grit lap could be used for pre-polishing. After this reset the machine and use finer laps for polishing. Tin oxide and diamond laps are used for polishing. In cutting about 25% of the gemstone material is lost. If a diagram is followed strictly and executed in the correct order, the faceting design will emerge correctly.

Stones are adhered to the end of a dop with a minimal amount of hard wax. The dop is then fitted into the quill and locked in place. It is very desirable to have a mechanism to remove the stone and then replace it. After replacement it must be precisely in the same relationship to the quill as it was originally.

Clare brought several samples of stones to pass around for us to see and touch as he talked a little about the types and qualities of stones for faceting.

The international faceting competition is held every two years. For the first time in several years, the U.S. team won this year's competition. Members of the U.S. Faceter's Guild have to be rated a master faceter to compete in the national and international competitions.

Clare says that faceting is not complicated. To someone who knows nothing about faceting, it seems fairly mind boggling. The art of faceting encompasses a wide field of endeavor. Some gems may be produced with very little effort; others may require many hours of tedious work. The cutting of faceted gems is an exacting procedure. The good facet cutter is concerned with the precise placement, shape, size, and polishing of the facets that completely surround what is known as a faceted gem. Basically, faceting can be defined as cutting multiple flat planes on gemstone material to enhance its light reflecting properties. The learning curve never ends.

BEGINNER SCRIMSHAW

Shop Notes By Karen Fox

The newest project underway in the workshop under the tutelage of Clare Gagnon is 'scrimshaw'. This is a type of folk art dating from at least the 17th century in which whale teeth, whale bones and walrus tusks are engraved or lightly carved with a picture or design. Obviously beginners won't be using such precious materials, so we are starting out with slabs of white Corian, the material used to make high-end countertops. A brief description of the procedure we are using follows:

- 1. Find or draw a picture to be transferred and resize it as required (e.g. with a photocopier).
- 2. Tape a piece of carbon paper face-down onto the Corian, then center and tape the picture on top.
- 3. With a very hard sharp pencil (e.g. 4H), trace the picture to transfer it to the Corian.
- 4. Remove the carbon paper and spray the transferred image with a transparent acrylic spray to prevent smudging. Allow to dry.
- 5. Use an engraving tool (such as a sharp triangular sail needle imbedded in a dowel) to carve the lines into the Corian. One technique involves holding the tool and applying downward pressure with one hand while pushing the tool forward with the thumb of the other hand.
- 6. When most of the pattern is engraved, use a Q-tip to apply waterproof ink to the grooves. Wipe off with a paper towel, leaving ink in the grooves.
- 7. Deepen the grooves, complete the pattern, correct mistakes and add detail as required.
- 8. Recoat with ink and use a steel pad to scour away the residue and clean the surface.
- 9. Trim, frame or shape the slab as required to finish the piece.

It's surprising how quickly this project can progress, and the outcome is limited only by your own imagination!

MARS




MARS

TRADITIONAL AUGUST BIRTHSTONE -

CARNELIAN
