# **LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM**

The June Program was an awesome slide show and narrative about Mount St. Helens before and after its 1980 eruption presented by Tony and Sandie Fender.

We saw gorgeous pictures of Mount St. Helens prior to its eruption when it looked very similar to Japan's Mt. Fuji. Then on May 18, 1980, about a third of the mountain blew off and spewed ash 35 to 40,000 feet into the atmosphere. One hundred eighty miles away in Yakima, Washington, ash had to be bulldozed off the streets.

The eruption was considered an asymmetric blast because a bulge formed on the <u>side</u> of the mountain. Then an earthquake caused the bulge and the area above it to collapse and begin running down the mountain which created a vent and lead to the blast. Photographs taken 35 miles north of the mountain by Gary Rosenquist were stupendous.

New wildlife started with zillions of frogs. The frogs were an abundant food source for rodents and then birds came back. A herd of Roosevelt elk, which is probably the healthiest, strongest herd of elk in the country, is a great example of how resilient nature really is.

# TRADITIONAL JULY BIRTHSTONE -

## RUBY

To Hindus the Ruby is the "King of Gems," and is said to have sprung from the blood of the Demon God Vala. It is often associated with the red planet Mars and the sun.

Natural healers use the Ruby for headaches and to protect from psychic attack. Burmese soldiers wearing one <u>inside</u> their skin were thought to be invincible in battle. If you dreamed of Rubies it was said to predict unexpected guests, or success in business or money matters. It was once believed to protect the wearer from all kinds of witchcraft, plague, and famine if worn on the left side. Ruby symbolizes love, loyalty and stability.
