May 2015 BLM/DAC Field Trip to Lavic Siding



On Friday May 20 there was a Field Trip for the Bureau of Land Management's DAC (Desert Advisory Council). Kim Erb was asked by the BLM Barstow Field Office manager to give a presentation at Lavic

Siding regarding rock collecting in the area. Kim sent out requests for atten-



dance both personally and via LA Rocks. The rockhound turnout was exceptional. What a surprise when the DAC arrived, members of the Culver City club had distributed and carried signs promoting rockhounding and earth sciences. Included amongst the 66 rockhounds present were 4 past or present presidents of the CFMS. Current CFMS president John Martin, Shirley Leeson (CFMS 1987 and also an AFMS past president 2008), Dick Pankey (2007) and Jennifer Haley (2014) were in attendance. BLM attendees, along with the DAC members, were Katrina Symons, the Barstow Field Office Manager, and Tom Zale, the acting District Manager. Everybody who wanted to say anything regarding rockhounding in general and Lavic in particular had their opportunity. They even let Robert Burson (Searchers CFMS ROTY 2015) talk!

We had a table with a display of rocks, jewelry, spheres, cabochons and photos that EVERYONE came by to inspect and gawk at. One photo album supplied by Adam Dean (CFMS Field Trips – South) had pictures of the local agates that would knock your socks off. A hearty thank you goes out to Jimmy Peterson and Kim for display items. Diamond Pacific's Bill Depue produced a beautiful display of cabs from the Cady's area. We even had a bucket of interesting rocks collected from within 100 feet of the display table for anyone to take.

After the discussion, Tom Zale presented Kim with a certificate and an award for her work with the BLM's DAC and her efforts for rockhounds specifically. That caught us all off guard! Sweet!

It was very satisfying to note that the BLM field trip organizers had to make several calls to regroup their members when it was time for them to leave for their next stop. They were all searching the grounds for beautiful agates and jaspers!

On Saturday 5/21 there was also a decent turnout of rockhounds at the DAC meeting in Barstow that had the Mohave Trails National Monument as its focus. Rockhounds were far fewer in number at this meeting than at Lavic, but their opinions were voiced louder than ever and were well received by the Council. While I'm certain that it's easier to gather rockhounds on their natural desert hunting grounds than it is to cage them in a meeting hall, the caged rockhounds were very effective and persuasive advocates for the hobby. Also a Memorandum of Understanding regarding the Hauser Geode Beds was signed at the meeting by the BLM's District Manager Tom Zale, Field Manager Carlie Simmons and the CFMS/ALAA

(American Lands Access Assoc.) reps John Martin and Shirley Leeson. Additionally, in the latest edition of the BLM's California News Bytes Issue #725, rockhounding is mentioned. Not only that, but there is also a link to the original version of the LA Times story "A Lost Gem" which features comments by several Searchers as well as a picture of Jimmy holding the sphere of Thulite that was on display at the Lavic presentation.

Thank you to everyone who attended and supported these important rockhound related BLM activities.

Field Trip: Himalaya Tourmaline Mine Combined Trip June 18, 2016 — 10am to 3pm Dig Your Own Stones

What: Tourmaline Dig Field Trip.

Where: We are planning a field trip to the world's most famous tourmaline mine, the Himalaya Mine near beautiful Lake Henshaw in San Diego County, 20 miles east of Pala. Because of the popularity of this trip, and the limited number of spaces available, this trip is for members only. Guests may be placed on the "waiting list" and cleared to attend if space becomes available.

Access: You can drive to within about 200 feet of the area, mostly on paved or maintained dirt road.

Minerals: Pink, green and watermelon tourmalines are what the mine is known for. Some other minerals found here are quartz crystals, apatite, morganite, clevelandite, calcite, lepidolite, feldspar, stibiotantalite, topaz, and spessartine garnet.

Details: Over 200,000 pounds of quality ore have been produced here since 1898. The miners tunnel into the pegmatite in search of rich pockets of tourmalines. Small pockets and individual gemstones are carried out with the overburden dirt and rocks. Now, the mine operators bring dump truck loads of the overburden material down the hill to a flat area to allow easier access for the public. "Digging" involves shoveling ore-containing dirt into your 3 or 5-gallon bucket and pouring it into a sifting screen on a wooden bench. The results have been quite good in the past. The mine operators provide buckets, shovels, sifting screens, a tub of water to rinse the dirt off of the gravel and a table to set everything on.

Cost: This is a fee-to-dig location. The fee for our group is \$50 for adults, \$25 for children ages 13-17 and children 12 years old and younger are free. All paid attendees will receive a raffle ticket for a special gem prize from the mine owners.

Reserve A Space: Space on this field trip is limited to the first 25 people who confirm. A list of names will be on the list provided to the mine operators. Mark Nelson, of the Pasadena Lapidary Society, will coordinate the trip. Contact him to reserve your place. (909) 996-1784 or pasadenalapidary@aol.com.

What you need: lunch, shoes that can get muddy, sun hat, gloves, a quart slide-lock plastic sandwich bag to put your finds in, an old toothbrush for scrubbing the crystal stones, and plenty of drinking water. They will provide all tools for digging at no extra charge! Also available: Bags of high grade gem pocket ore are available for purchase which can be taken home for screening. Faceted gemstones including Himalaya Mine tourmalines and Oregon Sunstones are also available for purchase on site.

In the Field: BLM Update

I was asked by a BLM field manager to pass along this message from BLM's State Director:

The Mojave Trails National Monument is a stunning mosaic of rugged mountain ranges, ancient lava flows, and spectacular sand dunes. Protection of this area will preserve its natural, cultural and historic legacy while preserving traditional uses of the area.



The Presidential proclamation that designated the Monument provides latitude for existing uses and activities and does not limit or prohibit rock hunting. Rockhounders are welcome to continue collecting limited amounts of rocks, minerals, and gemstones in the Monument in accordance with the Bureau of Land Management's rock collecting guidelines.

Over the coming months, the Bureau of Land Management will be developing a management plan to help guide the uses and activities that occur in the Monument. We are committed to an open and transparent process with the public as we move forward in developing this plan.

All of you should also be aware that rockhounds have a friend in Diane Feinstein. When she recently learned that we were told that we could not collect in the Mojave Trails National Monument, she wrote a letter to the Interior Secretary requesting that the Department of the Interior clarify that rockhounding continues to be allowed. We believe that her letter resulted in the announcement I am sharing.

The BLM is required to develop management plans for each of the new monuments. It will be important that we be represented as stakeholders in that process if we want to keep our collecting locations open as well as the routes that take us there. I hope this is a wake up call to everyone to get involved in the process!


