#### FEDERATION DELEGATE REPORT:

The CFMS "August Harvest of Gems" will be held August 21st thru 23rd, 1992, in Hayward, CA. Anyone who may be interested in attending this 53rd Annual Show and Convention, or anyone interested in exhibiting please see me for more information and reservation forms. One of the treasures to be exhibited this year is the 22,892.5 carat American Golden Topaz.

This American Golden Topaz is the largest faceted gemstone in the collection of the National Museum of Natural History at the Smithsonian Institution and will be on display during regular show hours.

The 172-facet stone, requiring 1,000 hours over a two-year period to cut and polish from a 15 pound preform which began as a 26-pound piece of rough, is pure in color and design. It is golden yellow in color and has three blue chevrons of color located partially under the table that cause the perceived color of the stone to vary, depending upon the viewing angle.

This Topaz was presented to the Smithsonian in 1988, by its owners, Doctors Marie and Ed Bogatta of Seattle, WA, and William Maloney, Jr, Executive VicePres, the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, on behalf of the mineral hobbyists of America and the six Regional Federations that raised funds so the donation could be made.

GREETINGS TO THE SEARCHERS FROM KIWI LAND - NEW ZEALAND

Jacque and I arrived in Auckland on North Island February 5th after spending several days in Honolulu.

We've crossed the International Date Line so we are 21 hours ahead of your time. Lost one day enroute.

Our first day in Auckland was spent trying to get over jet lag and just finding our way around. The next day we looked for a motorhome to rent. After a few calls I didn't find anything. Then I walked over to the rental place called Leisure Port which handles rentals for about 4 companies. When they found out how long we wanted to rent one they were suddenly able to locate one. After another half day of negotiating we finally arrived at a contract price.

We picked up the motorhome the next day, loaded it and started out to tour North Island. We rented the mid-sized motorhome which is about 20 ft long and like a Class C (bed over the cab). It is a diesel with a 5 speed stick shift. Fuel for it is about half the cost of gas which makes it economical to drive.

This was my first experience at driving on the left side of the road. It was real exciting trying to find our way out of town. They don't have many traffic signals or stop signs. Mainly they have "give aways" (yield) then you come to a "round-about" (traffic circle). All this while you are trying to shift with your left hand. We survived and finally got to the "motorway" (freeway) so after that it was easier.

The "motorparks" (campgrounds) here combine tents, motorhomes, cabins, and almost a motel and are quite nice. They have kitchen facilities as well as restrooms and showers. With power they run from \$7 to \$10 U.S. currency.

New Zealand is a very green country with lots of vegetation. It is mostly hilly with a few high volcanic cones. The roads are narrow and full of curves but are usually well surfaced. The seasons are reversed here so it is like a California August as far as the climate. Lots of fresh vegetables and fruit this time of year. We saw Kiwis growing and Nashi Pears (we call them Asian Apples) -- very good.

The population is 4 million people, 50 million sheep plus plenty of cattle and deer farms. The economy is primarily agriculture. About one third of the people are Maoris (who are Polynesian descendents).

We are traveling around the North Island. First headed up to Cape Reinga the northern most point. Then back along the Tasman Sea coast to the Kauri Forest. These are their oldest trees some are 1200 years old with 16 ft diameter trunks and 120 ft high. In the old days there were used to make the 100 man dugout war canoes.

As we pass through towns we stop at the museums to learn as much history as we can. South of Auckland there is an area that has lots of thermal activity. At Hot Water Beach there is a thermal spring at low tide where you can dig a hole in the sand and have your own spa.

Near Lake Taupa is a geo-thermal plant producing 5% of New Zealand's electricity. Lots of steam vents, mud pots, and geysers throughout the area. Rotorua a big tourist town which also has lots of thermal areas and smells of sulphur. They say you get used to it.

We still have the Southern part of the North Island to see and then we'll take a ferry over to the South Island for the rest of our time here. Until next month.

#### FIELD TRIP NEWS:

As most of you know the March 13-15 field trip to Chuckwallas/Wileys Well area was cancelled due to inclement weather and illness of several members. I hope this has not inconvienced anyone of you. If so please accept my apologies.

Information concerning the upcoming extended field trip beginning Memorial Day weekend is available for pick up at the tables at the rear of the meeting room. This information includes dates, places, maps, motel listings and types of material that can be found in these areas.

I would also like to remind you that the April field trip to Hackberry Wash has had a date change. Originally we scheduled it Apr 17 - 19 but it is now scheduled Apr 24 - 26th. This will be a combined trip with the Santa Ana club and the Orange County Gem and Mineral Club. There will be a wide variety of material available all over the area including geodes, copper minerals, smoky quartz, topas, lepidolite, petrified wood, etc. Any further questions please give me a call. See map elsewhere in this bulletin.

On March 28th there will be a self-guided field trip to Tick Canyon, this will be a one day trip. I have checked out the talus slopes and stream bed in the canyon on Feb 29th and found most material to be in those areas. The upper digging areas were covered with a layer of rock and dirt so digging would be rather tough. I am uncertain as to whether U.S. Borax did this to protect their reserves or to keep zeolitic minerals from washing down the canyon. To get there take the 210 Fwy to the 14 Fwy North until you reach the Sierra Highway Exit. Follow Sierra Highway north for about 6.5 miles until you reach Davenport Road on the right. Follow Davenport Road east for 1.5 miles and you will pass thru two black dumps. Park on one of the dumps and collect north of the road in the dumps and streambed. As usual the Searchers assume no liability for you or your guests nor Acts of God. Good rockhounding!

A little graphite mixed with chrome oxide and applied to a muslin buff makes a wonderful jade polishing agent. This works on hard-to-polish agate too.


7-Up can be used to clean silver and gold findings. Dip, rinse well and rub with a soft cloth. Use separate solutions for gold or silver.

# April 24\(\perp26\) 1991 Field Trip Hackberry Wash/SARM Claims

Directions: Take Interstate 15 east to Barstow. From there take Interstate 40 east towards Needles. You will pass thru Ludlow and on to the Goffs Road Exit. Follow the paved road to Goffs for 9.0 miles. You may also exit at Mountain Springs Road to get to Goffs. Once you reach Goffs follow Lanfair Road north for 11.7 miles where you will find members of the SARMS and other OCGMC clubs. If you reach Lanfair you have driven too far - backtrack. You will know when you are at the right place when you see the blue/white ribbons. Nearest supplies are in Goffs and Cadiz. The total mileage from Anaheim to Hackberry Wash is about 250 miles. Cars will take an average of 5 hours to get there; trailers and RV's will naturally take atleast 6 hours.

Dry camp - bring food, water, firewood, picks, shovels, hammers, canteens, etc...
