

The CFMS Fall Meeting was held November 8, 1997 in Visilia, CA. Meeting was called to order by CFMS President, Rosemarie Young. Formalities were completed with 100 directors and 48 officers and chairmen present. A quorum was established. An Agenda was adopted. Standing Rules and Minutes of the June 21, 1997 meeting corrected, accepted and approved.

The 1997 CFMS Show in Ventura was a good show but attendance was lower so the return to the CFMS would be approximately \$5000 since all bills had not been submitted.

For the first time in many years, two clubs bid for the 1999 Show. The Santa Lucia Rockhounds of Paso Robles and the Mother Lode Mineral Society of Modesto. The Mother Lode Society won the vote of the Directors. Hopefully the Santa Lucia Rockhoundswill submit a bid for the 2001 show.

There were four entries for the All American Club. First place for large clubs was Santa Clara Valley Gem and Mineral Society and first place for small clubs was Lake Elsinore Gem and Mineral Society.

Sixty-Eight people attend the Earth Science Studies at Zzyzx Road, Soda Springs and Camp Paradise this past year. A motion was made to increase the fee for these seminars to \$200. Motion approved. The 1998 Zzyzx Earth Science Studies program will be held from March 15th to 22nd. Motion was made to add \$200 to 402L, Public Relations Fund. Motion approved.

There were two delinquent societies as of Nov 1st, 1997, Hi Desert Gold Diggers and Southwest Rockwranglers.

Two new clubs were accepted, West Coast Prospectors and Treasure Hunters and Lone Pine Gem and Mineral Club.

On a recent CFMS Field Trip South a BLM ranger was invited to attend the trip into Afton Canyon. As a result of this trip the ranger is going to join the Mojave Desert Gem and Mineral Society in Barstow. It was suggested that perhaps Clubs could invite a BLM person on one of their trips to show them first hand what and how rockhounds do.

# FEDERATION REPORT (Cont'd):

CFMS Historian, Shirley Leeson is working on the CFMS History and asked if Clubs or anyone who may have some history that perhaps should be included in the CFMS History she would like to have it.

Insurance this year will be \$1.00 per member. This is in addition to the \$1.50 dues we pay for each member.

The Museum Committee has standing exhibits of the Nevada Minerals at the museum in Henderson, NV, California minerals at the state museum in Mariposa; and Los Angeles Museum and a display at the Jurupa Cultural Center. In fairness to the Museum's exhibits can only be withdrawn for the annual CFMS Shows.

Public Lands - Fish and Wildlife Services did not list the Horned Lizard on the endangered list, the BLM has held meetings to discuss the management plans to help the lizard from being listed. Those plans include further restriction on public access and public activities on public lands. A proposal to create a five mile protective buffer zone around endangered plants. If these plants are so located the entire desert could be closed. Many other problems exist that could further restrict access to Public Land.

Tax Advisors Report - the Board of Equalization (sales tax) in a letter dated Sep 10, 1997 stated that the Board requires applicants to provide enough information to insure compliance with reporting requirements. The Board recognizes there are instances where minimal information is requested.

# BLM CAMPING INFO:

During our Thanksgiving outing several interpretations of the cost of BLM Camping were heard. Perhaps the following information excerpted from a BLM brochure will help clarify Long-Term and Short-Visit costs.

A permit is required to camp in a designated Long-Term Visitor Area (LTVA) between September 15 and April 15. The permit authorizes the permittee to camp within any designated LTVA using those camping or dwelling unit(s) indicated on the permit between the period September 15 to April 15. There are two types of permits, Long-Term and Short-Visit. The Long Term permit fee is \$100.00 (U.S. funds only) for the entire season and any part of the season. The Short-Visit permit is \$20.00 for seven consecutive days. The Short-Visit permit may be renewed an unlimited time for the cost of \$20.00 for seven consecutive days. No refunds are made on permit fees.

To be valid the Short-Visit permit or LTVA permit decal must be affixed at the time of purchase with the adhesive backing to the bottom right hand corner of the windshield of all transportation vehicles and be in a clearly visible location on all camping units. A maximum of two (2) secondary vehicles is permitted.

The permit may not be reassigned or transferred by permittee.

For your safety and privacy, you must maintain a minimum of 15 feet of space between camping units.
