Searchers FIELD TRIP Baxter Wash-North Cadys

Saturday & Sunday, November 18 &19, 2017

MEET: 8am at Basin Road and I-15 off ramp (south side) east of Barstow.

We leave at 8:30am after waiver forms are signed.

NOTE: Open to all CFMS affiliated clubs and members. 4WD required OR 2WD truck with experienced driver. NO LOW CLEARANCE PASSENGER CARS! Roads are sandy and rough. Rides can be arranged at campsite. Food, water and gas can be had in Barstow or 20 miles to Baker. These are remote sites with no facilities. Camping site is within 2 miles on Basin Road, look for Searchers sign. Temperatures should be comfortable with cold nights. Be prepared. The material sought will include fluorite, agates, jaspers, onyx, and sagenite nodules. Other finds are possible. Be prepared for hard rock mining for better material although much float is present. Be reminded that these areas are not theme parks and that wildlife and rough terrain is common. Play nice and be safe. As usual potluck on Saturday night.


Pasadena FIELD TRIP 1: Barstow Area WGMS Honey Onyx

Claim Novembr 4 - 5, 2017 Joe Goetz, Trip Leader



Where: The field trip will be to the Whittier Gem & Mineral Society's Honey Onyx Claim, located just east of Barstow, and to other sites in this area. We use the Claim as a place for camping and for gathering on Friday evening. Take I-15 from Barstow to Fort Irwin Road. Turn right at the end of the off ramp. To access the camp area you will unlock the gate on this road. The lock combination is 4321. After you pass through the gate, you must lock it behind you (this is very important). Follow the "P/W" signs to the camp.

Meet: There will be guided field trips on both Saturday and Sunday and we will leave from the Oak Tree Inn (each day at 8:00-8:30 AM). To get to the Oak Tree Inn take the Ghost Town Rd exit off of the 15 freeway, turn right, turn right again and go past the gas station and you will see the motel on the right. Saturday eve-ning we will meet at Peggy Sue's Restaurant for dinner.



Collecting: Materials which may be collected: red moss agate, petrified wood and palm root, algae agate, and other unnamed agate, jasp-agates, jaspers, fossils, etc. The honey onyx is still there but it is hard rock mining. If you have any or have seen it, you know that it is well worth the effort involved.

Tools: rock pick and bag for general collecting: sledges, wedges, chisels, pry bars, etc. for those rockhounds who really want to get serious with the honey onyx.

Overnight: Camping is available at the WGMS Claim. Also, Barstow is very close. For beginning rockhounds (without campers, trailers, etc.) you may wish to stay in a motel in town and drive to the Oak Tree Inn each morning – many of the regular folk on the trip stay at the Oak Tree Inn (760-254-1148 ext. 400), the address is considered in Yermo.

Pasadena FIELD TRIP 2: Afton Canyon

November 23-26th 2017

History: About 15,000 years ago there was a massive lake catching the snow melt on the north side of the San Gabriel and San Bernardino mountains. Lake Manix was 11 miles wide and stretched 90 miles from the mountains to the hills at Afton, where it was 500-600 feet deep! Whether by erosion or earthquake there was a catastrophic raining of the lake which cut the beautiful canyon that we see today!



The Plan: Each day over the long Thanksgiving weekend we will lead guided trips to areas within Afton Canyon and Baxter Wash. This area is known to be productive for rockhounds, and is a great field trip that is interesting to both the novice and the seasoned Rockhound. The views will surprise and amaze you!

Registering For This Trip: Registration is required for this field trip.

Access: With any luck the weather will be perfect to collect lapidary material and a good time will be had by all. This field trip is not suitable for passenger cars. High-clearance vehicles, trucks and SUV's are required. 4x4 travel is recommended. Collecting: Red and yellow agate, jasper, plume and sagenite, opalite, calcite rhombs, chalcedony roses, amygdules, green fluorite, onyx and much more — don't forget great photographs!


Day Trip or Lodging?: Because of the distance to the meeting point, from Pasadena, this trip is not recommended as a day trip without at least one overnight stay. There are plenty of motels in Barstow, which is only 42 miles (1 hour) from the camp site. Camping: The camping area is just above the BLM Afton Canyon Camp-ground (at the group camp or overflow camping area). The camp area is on the right just before going downhill to the official BLM camping area and at the end of the curve. There should be a PLS field trip sign on the fence where you turn to pull into the overflow camp-ing area. The overflow camping area is excellent for self-contained campers. The regular BLM campground is nearby and is another option for our members as a place to camp that has toilets, water and fire pits.

Meals: There are no facilities for food in the area. Those planning to camp should be self-contained with enough food and water for the days you are there. Those "motel camping" in Baker or Barstow should plan to bring food and water each day. For those joining us on Thursday, our Thanksgiving feast will be a potluck - pre-pare enough on one dish so that it can be shared by 8 people.

Briefing: Whether you camp or "motel camp" we will meet for a briefing at 8am each day. If you drive up on Friday and arrive after we have departed, we will leave a note giving you suggested areas to explore until we return to camp between 3 and 4pm that afternoon.

Registering For This Trip: Registration is required for this field trip. Weather is a factor that could affect this trip and could determine where we actually end up going. It is important that we know who is planning to attend the trip, how many and a good cell phone contact number because, as with everything in life, plans can change - so let our field trip leader know if you are planning to attend! History Note From Steve Mulqueen

Henry G. Hanks became the first State Mineralogist for California, serving during the period 1880 – 1886. The mineral hanksite, from Searles Lake, is named in his honor.

History:

On May 15, 1880, the California Governor, under the Act of 1880, appointed Henry G. Hanks the State Mineralogist. Under this act, Hanks reported directly to the Governor and as a result two new publications were created under his service, the Annual Report of the State Mineralogist series and Special Publication series. Prior to his appointment, the State Legislature established the State Mining Bureau, which required the Bureau and the mineralogist to be located in San Francisco. Hanks later started his own assaying company, Pacific Chemical Works, while in San Francisco.


