SAFETY REPORT

An incident at Quartzsite this year brought to mind an ever present problem in campsites.

How many of you have driven into a campground and found trailers, motor-homes, etc., parked so close together that it would have been impossible to get any one of the rigs out in a hurry? Not only right next to each other, but end to end with absolutely no room in between!

A minimum of eight (8) feet is required by the fire department. They advise no "circle round", although with the minimum requirement between rigs this should be no problem. They emphasize that we are not protecting ourselves against Indians — just FIRE!

At the Quartzsite fire this year, the rig became engulfed in flames and next to it was a locked truck and camper--no way to move it. Another was pushed out of the way.

At a fire several years ago, a fifthwheeler was parked right up to the front of a motorhome and behind that was a van which caught fire. There was absolutely no way to get that motorhome out of the way. Please watch the spaces between rigs. With lots of rockhounding coming up soon, keep this in mind.

And what are the causes of these fires? There are many. We heard that the one this year was caused by not wiring solar panels correctly although we have been unable to verify this. Nevertheless, take heed and be sure to follow directions very carefully, or better yet, have it done by someone who knows what they are doing.

The fire in the van several years ago was caused by a propane stove, inside the van, which was left on to make coffee while the owner went for a shower. Needless to say, he did not have his coffee and the van was a total loss.

A forgotten curling iron was the cause of another fire. Leaking gas lines are almost always a sure way to cause a fire.

Friends were following an RV down the highway and saw one of the propane tanks which had been secured with a bungy cord come lose. The canister was dragging behind the rig on the road. That one was helped by a trucker before a fire erupted. Be sure to secure everything!

A vehicle or recreational fire is almost always a total loss so be safe--not sorry. Always check your rig before each travel trip. Keep a "checklist" so nothing is skipped. You check your food, don't you? What is more important than to......

CHECK SAFETY!!!

Take heed so we can see you on the next trip.

April Field Trip Report - Hackberry Wash (SARMS hosted)

Atleast fifty rockhounds, 20 of whom were Searchers, were present at Hackberry Wash on April 24-26, 1992. Dr. Madsen and family (6 members) came in full force plus brought a guest on their first trip. 23 rigs were in attendance with the Santa Ana Rock and Mineral Society, the Victor Valley Club and the Lake Havasu Gem and Mineral Club also present. On Friday afternoon Frank Davis, Nancy Kramp and I went up to the California Mine where we collected garnet, chalcopyrite, chrysocolla, azurite and mica. Saturday morning 15 Searchers and about 15 other club members collected geodes from 1 cm to over 7 inches in diameter. Small but attractive limb casts; beautiful red flame agate; some palm root; and yellow/green onlitic opal were also collected on Saturday afternoon. Some of us drove to Caruthers Canyon in search of topaz and other pegmatite minerals. The canyon and its formations were spectacular but the hike to the rhyolite formation would have required more than the few hours that we had so we opted for the next best thing. Elmer Parsons, Russ Korn, Frank Davis and I hiked up to the nearby Sagamore Mine where we collected some pyrite, calcite, and epidote specimens. The weather was quite pleasant with some cloud cover providing temperatures in the high 80's and low 90's. Evening temperatures ranged from the high 40's to the 50's. There was plenty of wildlife too.... jackrabbits, snakes, lizards, birds, a tortoise, and ground squirrels. Some members ventured into Laughlin for some gambling. Saturday evening there was an excellent potluck dinner. Nobody left disappointed with the weather, the company or the collecting. A big THANKS to the Santa Ana Rock and Mineral Society for their invitation, hospitality and well marked trails to the collecting sites. Some of the collected material will be on display at the May general meeting.

Extended Field Trip Notes


The weather can often turn from sunshine to snow and this year will no doubt be the same. Be prepared for different weather conditions that we may encounter. On Saturday there will be one or two trips to collecting sites in the area. In the morning we will collect at Copper World Mine (azurite,malachite,chrysocolla) and the Mohawk Mine (smithsonite,galena, sphalerite, cerussite) and/or the Mile-Hi and Amethyst Queen Claims (phantomed amethyst and clear quartz crystals). Additional information will be handed out for the remaining legs of the extended trip depending on your particular destination or breakpoint. The extended trip trekees will head to Beaver at their own pace on Sunday. There are no planned trips for Sunday so you may want to stop in Las Vegas or Mesquite for some gambling or do some sightseeing.

All members interested in collecting on Monday morning should be in their vehicles and ready to go at 8:30 AM. On Monday or Tuesday we will have a chicken dinner at the Ponderosa Restaurant and we will have Steve Hodges at our disposal on Monday and Tuesday to guide us to a few collecting spots possibly for martite (black, metallic, nonmagnetic magnetite) in single crystals and plates, obsidian, rhodonite, agate, copper minerals, and other mineral specimens. Steve has been concentrating on lapidary materials the past few weeks.
