The Convention meeting of the CFMS Board of Directors was held August 10, 1996, Riverside, CA. The meeting was called to order by President Pat LaRue. The Pledge of Allegiance followed by the invocation and introductions, with 106 directors, 5 officers and 22 chairmen present. A quorum was established and the agenda and standing rules adopted. Minutes of the November 11, 1995 meeting were read, corrected and accepted.

At mid-year the financial reports look good. Income is running close to budgeted amounts. Expenses are below budget at this time.

The increase in Dues has brought in much needed revenue. Everyone is watching expenses closely.

If all trends continue through the last half of the year CFMS will have a good financial year.


Our August program will be conducted by Jim Williamson - this will be a surprise - haven't a clue but I'm sure it will be a good one.

OCTOBER FIELD TRIP - October 12th and 13th:

This trip will be to Searles Dry Lake at Trona, east of Ridgecrest. The best route is up highway 395, through Kramer Junction and turn right at Johannesburg. I contacted the person in charge and expect to get a "flyer" for inclusion in next months bulletin. The schedule is pretty much the same as last years, however, with two field trips Saturday on the dry lake surface and in sticky black mud for lake minerals and a trip Sunday morning for Natural Pink Halite.

For the trip for Halite on Sunday a large pry bar is recommended for prying loose the Halite specimens as well as cardboard boxes (like soda pop flats) and newspaper for transporting the specimens home.

It is suggested that you wear old clothes and either rubber boots or tennis shoes since the field trips can be dirty, wet and salty. Also bring some sort of containers so you can bring home some lake brine for use in cleaning crystals. If you try to clean them with water (instead of lake brine) you will dissolve them.

This year we will be camping at the Trona Trailer Park with full hook ups. The ownership has just changed hands and I couldn't find out their current reservation policy. The owner is to call me back. I'll try to make reservations for the whole group.

WHAT IS CALCITE ONYX?

Onyx is a variety of the mineral calcite that is deposited in caves. Rain water becomes charged with carbon dioxide as it passes through the air qnd takes into solution a small amount of calcium carbonate as it passes through limestone and dolomite formations. When this rain water eventually enters cave openings, it loses its carbon dioxide and deposits the remaining calcium carbonate as onyx.
