

April's birthstone is the perennial first choice for engagement rings, but it is also the anniversary gem for the 10th and 60th years of marriage when eternity bands and other diamond-detailed rings replace original wedding bands. The ancient Greeks believed that diamonds were splinters of stars fallen to earth. It was even said that they were the tears of the Gods or perhaps crystallized lightning or hardened dew drops. The origin of diamonds is still something of a mystery, even to scientists and geologists. India is thought to be the first river-bed source of diamond mining. The ancient Hindus called the diamond "Vajra" (lightening) because of the sparks of light that it emits as well as its invincible strength. Diamonds are harder than any other substance on earth and found today in Australia, Botswana, Russia and South Africa. Diamonds have long been credited for having certain medicinal properties. During the middle ages, these gemstones were thought to heal illness, but only if the ailing person took the diamond into bed to warm it up first. Diamond's white hue signifies life, joy and innocence, but diamonds may be nearly any color in the rainbow plus a wide range of browns, grays, and white. Shades of yellow are most common, followed by colorless. Blue, black, reddish, and greenish are more valuable, some extremely so.

Our March program was a slide presentation by Searcher member Jim Peterson about his "Field Trips Across North, Central and South America." Jim and Ester Reynolds have traveled extensively across the United States and have recorded sights and field trip digs along the way. Here are some of the highlights of their trips:

Ketchikan, Alaska – quartz crystals, totem poles and brown bears Juneau, Alaska – visited by plane or boat only Glacier (Mendenhall) – grizzly cubs and gold dredging Five Fingers – a place where the '49ers panned for gold on the Yukon River Fairbanks, Alaska – caribou Alaska pipeline – Prado Bay Arctic circle sign about 400 miles north of Fairbanks, Alaska - permafrost Homer, Alaska – halibut fishing Salmon Glacier in Heider, Alaska Jade City – wooden sculptures by Native Americans Waterfall in Brazil Trilobites in natural history museum in Argentina Cape Horn – southern tip of South America South American glacier Yellowstone National Park – elk and buffalo Butte, Montana – found chrysocolla and fossils Bear Lake diggings (Bancroft) – apatite, tourmaline digging with \$5 permit Niagara Falls rainbow Virginia – Starlight crystal digging Arkansas - \$20 per day at Coleman's quartz crystal mine New Mexico – lepidolite New Mexico – crystal digging (desert roses) Grand Canyon Piggyback train ride through Copper Canyon in Mexico Tikal ruins Palenque ruins

Jim had some wonderful pictures of really beautiful places and had some great rockhounding. Thank you, Jim, for the nice presentation and a look at some new places to rockhound.

APRIL FIELD TRIP Ship Mountains and Marble Mountains April 26&27, 2008 9AM Departure Time

The April field trip will be to the Ship Mountains for Ship Mountain Opalite. I did an exploratory trip to the Ship Mountains with Carrie and Wei last fall. Like most of my trips we spent a fair amount of time slightly lost, but finally found the location we were looking for, which was honeycombed with old holes dug by previous rockhounds. I dug there for probably an hour, and was ready to give up in disgust when I found a brick sized piece. It was obvious when you find what you are looking for, it is pastel colors with complex patterns. When I got it home I also found that it was very hard and took a great polish with no pits. It is really nice rock.

We will be camping at the collecting site. As I indicated above the best collecting probably involves digging. It is digging in soft sand, but digging none the less. You will want to bring shovels and gloves if you plan to dig. I also like to bring a scrap tarp or blanket, one of the problems with digging in sand is it wants to drift back into your hole, so I shovel onto a tarp, and then drag the tart some distance from my hole and dump it. Of course there is always the possibility of good material in float. The rockhound books indicate several other collecting locations within a mile or two.

Sunday's plans are still a little fluid, probably collecting in the Marble Mountains which are quite close, and offer epidote and garnets in addition to marble. There is also an old mine, The Vulcan, that several Searchers collected at before, if any of them join us on this trip we may be able to talk them into leading us there on Sunday.

This will be a standard desert campsite, with no amenities, or water. We will have our normal Saturday night potluck. I plan to be at the campsite by Friday afternoon. Be prepared for heat in the day time and cold at night, although hopefully the weather will be mild. Bring water and sunscreen, The campsite should be reachable by all vehicles; last time there was one short sandy stretch to be a little cautious on.


Directions: Take I40 East to Ludlow. Exit at Ludlow, and gas up at the Chevron station, which also has basic supplies. Then take National trails Highway (old route 66) east to Danby Road (past Chambless). Go south on Danby Rd for \sim 1.5 miles, until you cross the railroad tracks and reach the old town site of Danby. Take the road right following the railroad (west) for 6.9 miles then there is a left turn up to the campsite/collecting area. I will have Searcher signs helping show the way. Closest motel is probably back at Ludlow.

On Sunday if we end up in the Marble Mountains we will be taking Mac Tul Rd north from Chambless till it ends, and the turning right (east) onto the dirt road, there are several collecting areas (and dirt roads) off to the left (north) of this road.

The Oceanview is close enough for a one day field trip, and will be tolerable in the heat of summer because of the breeze on the mountain and the splashing from the screening. I will put together a trip for this summer if enough people are interested.
