November Birthstone Topaz

Topaz is a gemstone available in a rich rainbow of colors. Prized for several thousand years in antiquity, all yellow gems in antiquity were called topaz. Often confused with citrine quartz (yellow) and smoky quartz (brown), quartz and topaz are separate and unrelated mineral species. The most prized color of topaz is called *Imperial topaz* after the Russian Czars of the 1800s and features a magnificent orange body color with pinkish undertones. Topaz also comes in yellow, pink, pur-

ple, orange, and the many popular blue tones.

November Birthstone Citrine

Citrine, the other birthstone for November is known as the "healing quartz". This golden gemstone is said to support vitality and health while encouraging and guiding hope, energy and warmth within the wearer. Citrine can be found in a variety of shades ranging from pastel yellow to dark brownish orange. It is one of the most affordable of gemstones and plentiful in nature. Citrine is found most frequently in Brazil, Bolivia, and Spain.

November Field Trip Siam Siding & Marble Mountains

We will be camping in the same area we always camp when collecting trilobites at Cadiz. We are not going to actually target the trilobites this trip, but as you will be at the base of the collecting area.

Saturday Jimmy will be leading us into the Marble Mountains. I believe this will be for high clearance vehicles only, 4x4 preferred. We will carpool from the camp for folks without trucks. We will leave camp at 9 AM on Sat.

We will have our traditional potluck and fire on Saturday night.

Sunday we will collect at Siam Siding for Chapenite. You need to dig **big** holes (in soft sand). This is best done by grouping into small teams. Some shovels are needed. Limited supplies and gas are available at Amboy. There is also a small motel there, which may or may not be open; there is a motel in Ludlow which is a bit further away.

September 9 2013 Omya Quarry

Hidden Dangers in Our Hobby

Acetone: An industrial type of solvent containing harmful vapor

Hydrogen sulfide: By-product of sulfur and water. Deadly poison!

Manganese: In dust or vapors, it can damage the nervous system.

Quartz, agate, sandstone, granite, chert, flint:

All are of the silica rock family. The dust from this family contributes to silicosis of the lungs.

Styrofoam: When heated or burned, it releases toxic gases.

Malachite: Work wet, as the dust created when working dry is toxic.

Lead: Known to enter the body from dust, fumes, and water. It can damage the brain and neuromuscular system. If you are using a material that is new to you, read the labels and heed any warning. We want all lapidarists to remain a healthy lot and continue to live long, active lives!
