

2008 LONG BEACH V.A. MEDIAL CENTER CREATIVE ARTS CONTEST

The Veterans Creative Arts Contest is an annual contest for all patients from the Veterans Hospitals worldwide. Each hospital has its own contest and the 1st place winners from this contest move up the Regional Level, then the 1st place winners from regional move up to the National Level. The National Veterans contest will be some time in October or November. This year the finals will be held here in Riverside, California. Please keep this in mind because one day during this week it is open for the general public to see. This would be a rare chance to see some amazing work our Veterans are doing.

We would again like to thank our outside Expert Judges this year: Dr. Walter Johnson and his bride Donna, and Robert Gullage Certified Gemologist from Burton's Gems and Opals, Anaheim, California. This year's judging was a very difficult task. It took seven different judges and four ties in three different categories to make the final decision for the 1st place winners. This was a very close contest.

This year's contest had 27 entries in 12 different classifications; from the Vocational Therapy Rock Shop we have first place winners in the Special Recognition Category, Jewelry Category, Beadwork, and Applied Arts Mixed Media. These four winners now continue on to the regional contest. We wish all of our participants the best at the next level.

A special congratulations to our new member Jesus (Jesse) Garza who is also a Searcher member. He has been in the program almost one year and took 3rd place in Beadwork with a knapped arrowhead necklace and 1st place in the Applied Arts Mixed Media Category with his slush box project. JANUARY PROGRAM

Our First Vice President of Programs Walter Mroch presented our January program entitled “What’s New at the Oceanview Mine, Pala District, California.” Walter gave us an overview of a real operating pegmatite mine with local geology, history and minerals.

Jeff Swanger is the owner of the Oceanview Mine. He has all the government permits required to operate the mine and has certified trainers in mining and safety. Almost all the other mines in the area are inoperative because they have not kept up with the legalities.

It’s a lot of hard work and planning to start up a new mine from scratch. (A typical rule is that 10% of what is mined is saleable, and of that 10% is gems). A swipe of the bulldozer gives a starting place. Drilling, using compressors, blasting, mucking out debris after blasting and core drilling come next. Vent lines are used to force air under ground to get rid of the dust. Battery packs for helmet lanterns are good for 16 hours underground. Cables draw the slusher bucket back and forth, but using a bobcat is the easy way for removing muck. For blasting, holes are drilled and debris blown out. A typical round is 14 holes. Tamp explosive charges in holes with newspaper and loose gravel packed tight. After blasts wait an hour for the dust to settle and then blow out.

The Oceanview Mine is open on weekends to screen mine the rough for gemstones at \$60 per person. Apatite (not common), feldspar, goshenite, morganite, kunzite, all kinds of quartz clusters, elbaite, tourmaline, columbite and aquamarine are to be found here. Lots of world-class stuff is coming out of this mine. Mine safety items have been added in the last year. For more information see www.digforgems.com



