Cargo Muchacho Mountains Field Trip

December 5-6, 2020 Meet 8:30am, Depart: 9:00am

The Anaheim Searchers will be headed to the Cargo Muchacho Mountains in the southeast Colorado Desert in the Lower Colorado River Valley, in Imperial County, California. This will be an exploratory/ prospecting style trip. We will arrive at the site on Friday, December 4. We will camp at an open area near the American Girl Mine.

Directions:

From Highway 8, Exit Ogilby Road, cross the highway and go north. Go 4 miles, cross the railroad tracks, and shortly after that turn right on American Girl Mine road. In about 2 miles, just before the Y in the road, you'll see a large flat open area where we will be camping. GPS Coords: [32.832143, -114.814761]

Watch for the Searcher signs! There is off-road vehicle activity in the area so we might have neighbors in the campsite.

Saturday we'll meet at 8:30 a.m. in the campsite.

We'll explore Site B [1] and look for dumortierite, agate, jasper, petrified wood and/or petrified palm. We'll check out the Tumco Ruins and Gold Rock Trading Post. If we have time we might go to Winterhaven Geodes [1,3] and check for geodes, chalcedony, agate, and nodules. We might explore other sites as time allows.

Sunday

On Sunday morning we'll look for kyanite by the American Girl Mine area [2], and then head home.

Since this is a new area for us, we recommend 4-wheel drive high-clearance vehicles. Camping is dry; bring all water and food as necessary. It might be cold at night.

Dumortierite Quartz: Rare Blue Quartz

Dumortierite quartz is blue colored quartz containing abundant dumortierite inclusions.

Dumortierite quartz is one of the rarer and more unusual blue varieties of quartz gemstones. It is a gemstone-quality combination of quartz aggregate, intergrown with the mineral known as dumortierite. Although quartz can occur in a wide range of colors, blue col-

ored quartz is surprisingly quite rare. The traces of dumortierite are responsible for its distinct color, which can range from light to dark blue and in some cases reddish-brown.

Dumortierite is an aluminum borosilicate ($Al_7BO_3(SiO_4)_3O_3$) with a hardness that can range from 7.0 to 8.5 on the Mohs scale. In aggregate form, mainly when cut, its hardness is 7.0. (the same as quartz), while crystal forms have a hardness rating of 8.5.

The mineral was first described in 1881 and was named after French paleontologist, Eugene Dumortier (1803-1873). Dumortierite also has a few industrial purposes other than jewelry. Since it is known to turn remarkably pure white in color when fired, it is often used for the production of porcelain and ceramics. It is sometimes mistaken for sodalite and has been used as imitation lapis lazuli.

THE GEMSTONE DUMORTIERITE

Dumortierite is a minor blue gemstone that usually forms as inclusions in Quartz. Its most common color is blue or grayish-blue, though pink and purple colors are also known. Dumortierite's durability, combined with a high hardness, would make this an ideal gemstone, but the lack of transparency and often dull luster limit its use.

ALL ABOUT

Pure Dumortierite gemstones are rarely encountered. Most lapidary-grade Dumortierite is dense blue inclusions of Dumortierite within Quartz. These gemstones are often called by the confusing term "Dumortierite Quartz", or may even be called "Blue Quartz". The inclusions can be present throughout the Quartz, or in splotches or zones, resulting in light and dark blue color zones.

The properties listed above are inherent to pure Dumortierite. However, since most Dumortierite gemstones are actually Quartz with Dumortierite inclusions, the properties listed under Quartz are the more accurate gemstone reference.

USES: Dumortierite is a minor gemstone used mostly in cabochons and lapidary carvings.
