American Federation of Mineralogical Societies

Dear Fellow Rockhounds:

As was stated at your Federation Meeting during the AFMS National Show in Ventura, CA, it was voted we would sponsor a VISA Card with the AFMS Logo on it.

This program would bring some much needed money into the AFMS treasury. At the present time, the AFMS gets only twenty-five cents (25c) per member from the respective federations.

Here is how the program works: For every person who sends back the application for either the Gold or Silver card, and it is approved, the AFMS will get one dollar (\$1.00) plus twenty-five cents (25¢) each time the card is used. All fees are waived the first year. Upon renewal after the first year, the fee will be based on which card you have. If you do renew, then the AFMS will get three dollars (\$3.00) and continue to get the twenty-five cents (25c) for each use.

All you, the clubs, have to do is send a copy of your roster with names and addresses to Dan McLennan, at the Central Office (address on left of this letter). He will, in turn, forward it to the company who is issuing the card. If, after you as an individual, do not want to receive anything more from the people, then let Dan know and he will see that your name is taken off the list.

An agreement in the contract states that the company will not, and cannot, sell or give away the list with our names on it.

This proposal was discussed very thoroughly at a special meeting on Tuesday prior to the Cracker Barrel session. Then, at the general business meeting on Wednesday, it was seen as a way to get badly needed money into the AFMS treasury.

It is hoped that everyone will at least take a card for the first year, even if you do not use it.

To clarify a point, the AFMS Endowment Fund money (interest only), can be used to help on special items for the AFMS, and not the general fund.

Remember, there are two (2) types of cards with very good benefits. Please, at least let the information be sent to you in order that you may decide with all the facts at your disposal.

January 1991 Field Trip Report

Unfortunately, I was unable to attend the Stoddard Wells Field Trip since I came down with the flu. In my place Milly and George Arvanites recorded the names of all Searchers in attendance and any special events that took place on the weekend. I greatly appreciate their help in collecting the information for this report. Thirteen Searchers were at Stoddard Wells by Friday evening with a total of 24 on Saturday. Friday night they all got together and had a campfire. The weather was constantly changing but it turned out to be the best weather the Searchers have experienced at Stoddard Wells this time of year. Searchers were busy selling and trading materials with others but few if any did any actual collecting at Verde Antique. Most people stayed and sold or traded material. As the weekend progressed the weather became more and more cold. By Sunday evening it was raining off and on and by Monday morning there was a light dusting of snow in the surrounding mountains. It sounds like everyone had an enjoyable trip!

Survey Results and 1991 Field Trips

First, I would like to thank all of the members who either brought their field trip forms to the January meeting or mailed them to me. It shows great resolve in effecting the way that the field trips will be run during 1991. I would also like to thank those individuals that have provided me with information on the unknown locations listed in last month's newsletter. Only 24 families responded to the field trip poll out of our total family membership of well over 130 families. This means that 106 or more families either can not or do not want to participate in Searcher's field trips. Field trips have been the binding force among the membership since the club's foundation. Members who miss out on field trips are denying themselves the greatest joy that any rockhound can experience - the actual collecting of material that one can treasure in its natural state or craft by hand. Please participate in club events so that this can be one of our strongest years yet. The following were the collecting sites selected: 1) Chambless/Cadiz (21x) 2) Crestmore Quarry (19x) 3) Last Chance Canyon and Stewart Lithia Mine/Pala (13x) 4) Chuckawalla and Copper World (12x) 5) Tecopa Hot Springs/Kingston Mtn and Deep Springs and Champion Mine and Hector Hills/Lavic (11x) 6) Hunter Mtn and Felix Fluorite Mine (10x).

There was no obvious selection for an extended field trip so I have chosen togage responses from several of the more active members that participated in previous extended field trips. The result was an extended field trip that will take us through Arizona, New Mexico, and Colorado. The field trip has been designed so that there will be three breakpoints for Searchers who cant make the entire trip. There will be two days of collecting in Arizona near Quartzsite. This is the first breakpoint for those who cant go on further. The next stop will be in New Mexico - Rockhound State Park, Blanchard Mine, Nitt and Graphic Mines, Kelly Mine, and the Harding Pegmatite. Searchers have two days to get to Deming, New Mexico. A two group convoy can will be used - one for those who want to get to Deming in 1 day and those in 2 days. There will be a total of 5 days of collecting throughout New Mexico. This is the second breakpoint for those who cant go on. Finally, several collecting localities in Colorado - Calumet Iron Mine, Ruby Mtn, and Crystal Peak Claims. Some of the sites require a minor fee and some collecting sites will allow camping at the site area. The Columbine Mineral Society (Salida, Colorado) will be sending me information on their scheduled field trips and also who to contact if we need a local guide. If there are any other trips during the timeframe of our trip I will arrange for our access as well. I have also requested information from the local camping/RV facilities. All of the towns have motels for those who cant stay in camp. Please do not hesitate to participate in the field trip up through atleast one of the breakpoints.

This trip will provide some of the most diverse collecting that has taken place in the history of the Searchers. This will be an historic trip since it will be the first

time that the club has gone to either New Mexico or Colorado and because everything from fire agate to complex mineral specimens will be available if you are willing to expend the effort. Please let me know if you are interested as soon as possible and I will put together a presentation of self-collected minerals and a breakdown by collecting site at one of the future meetings.

Some of the trip dates may be switched but all of the trips shown will be taken in 1991. All field trips are shown as starting on a Friday evening which is typical for most campers. This provides a full day of activities on Saturday rather than wasting half of it driving. Although members showed interest in both Pala and Crestmore I have opted to provide members with the appropriate contacts to arrange their own day trips since these trips are better taken on an individual basis. I did not feel that they would serve as good collective field trips. For Pala contact the Gems of Pala store at 619-742-1356. They sell buckets of material for \$10, \$25, and \$50 depending on the proximity to a gem tourmaline pocket. For collecting at the world famous Crestmore Quarry contact Ruth Kirkby, Jurupa Mountains Cultural Center (714)-685-5818. The fee is \$15 dollars (prepaid) per person and trips are usually held on Sunday Mornings at 8:00 AM. Access to this site will be limited since new owners are going to reopen the quarry commercially so call immediately for reservations or you may miss out on collecting at this historic locality.

Orange County Gem and Mineral Council

Unfortunately, I was unable to attend the meeting since I was down with the flu but I was provided with notes from the Secretary of the OCGMC, our own Nancy Kramp. The January 19th OCGMC meeting had representatives from all of the member clubs and associations. The CFMS Show in San Jose, CA will start June 14, 1991. Clare Gagnon provided a list of speakers available to other organizations for presentations from the Facetor's Guild. The OCGMC logo pins and patches were discussed as well as the materials. Plastic may be a good choice for the pins and badges. Todd Schowalter expressed interest in getting full support for the Orange County Fair from each of the clubs in the OCGMC. He would like to see demonstrations of lapidary skills and needs to know how the Searchers will help. The deadline for our input is April 1, 1991. Please contact either Todd Schowalter or myself if you feel that you can help support this activity in any manner. The OCGMC bylaws were discussed, corrected, voted on, and approved at the meeting. The Orange County Museum of Natural History sent Rose Martinez to the OCGMC meeting as a representative. She was subsequently elected into the OCGMC as a permanent member. She discussed the needs of the OCMNH and in particular said that they need help in their workshops and school outreach programs. They will provide training for conducting these programs. Dick Knox is going to be overseeing the development of the Science and Geology exhibits at the OCCIMC. wm


