

The Anaheim Searchers will be heading into the Chuckawalla Mountains for what is sure to be good collecting and adventure. The road into this collecting area is fun but challenging, helping me to realize that sometimes the journey is half the excitement. 4x4 is highly recommended with high clearance, although drivers with Subaru type vehicles who have previous offroad driving experience may be able to reach the deeper regions up the canyons. We will encounter loose sand, steep rocky grades, and some small obstacles. This area is known for interesting agates, amygdules, and green moss and white plume agates. Other interesting specimens can also be found like sagenites and calcite rhombs.

We will be dry camping on Graham Pass Rd (GPS: 33.603560, -115.043118). Bring water, firewood, and food for the weekend as this location is fairly remote, but Blythe is 30-40minutes drive to the East. Take I-10 East from Indio until you get to the Ford Dry Lake Rd exit. Take a right at the exit and head back West

on Chuckawalla Valley Rd for about 3.2 miles. You will see a yellow sign and Searchers sign for the left turn onto Graham Pass Rd. We will be a few hundred yards on the right by the low trees and drainage berm. We will meet at 8:30am on Saturday morning and head out at 9am. Those who stick around will head back out on Sunday for a shorter day of collecting.

Did you know?

What is the process for Searcher's to change their Bylaws?

In last month's Slab, we noted that Bylaws are rules that are adopted by an organization which govern the activities of and the members of an organization. We also noted that generally speaking, bylaws are legal documents that formally set out the rules of an organization. Article 10 of our current Bylaws are written as follows:

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

Section 1 – These By-Laws may be altered, amended, repealed, or replaced by new By-Laws in accordance with the following procedures:

- 1. The Board of Directors shall review the By-Laws, Standing Rules, and Job Duties annually. Alternately, the Board can appoint a committee to review the By-Laws, Standing Rules, and Job Duties.
- 2. The membership will be asked to submit written suggestions to the committee.
- 3. The committee will consider all suggestions and make recommendations accordingly to the Board.
- 4. Proposed changes will be reviewed by the Board, then presented at a general meeting and published for review by the membership in the <u>Rock Slab News</u> and on a members-only page of the Searchers website.
- 5. Additional written suggestions will be considered by the committee for final presentation to the Board.
- 6. Any significant changes will be published and distributed to the membership for comment prior to the membership's vote.
- 7. New By-Laws or changes to existing By-Laws may be adopted by a two-thirds majority of the membership present and voting at any regular meeting.

As you can see, there is a clearly documented process for how changes can be made to our Bylaws. Because Bylaws are a legal document, it is important that all required steps are followed. Following the proper steps when revising Bylaws can avoid unnecessary disputes and disagreements.

Next month, we will review two additional club documents - The Standing Rules and Job Duties.

Trilobite

FOSSIL ARTHROPOD

Alternative Title: Trilobitomorpha

Trilobite, any member of a group of extinct <u>fossil</u> arthropods easily recognized by their distinctive three-lobed, three-segmented form. Trilobites, exclusively marine animals, first appeared at the beginning of the <u>Cambrian Period</u>, about 542 million years ago, when they dominated the seas. Although they became less abundant in succeeding geologic periods, a few forms persisted into the <u>Permian Period</u>, which ended about 251 million years ago.



Because trilobites appear fully developed in the Cambrian Period, it appears likely that the ancestral trilobites originated during the <u>Ediacaran Period</u> (630 million to 542 million years ago) of <u>Precambrian</u> times. An organism that may be ancestral to the trilobites, as well as to other arthropods, may be represented by <u>Spriggina</u>, which is known from Precambrian shallow-water marine deposits in Australia. Trilobites are frequently used for stratigraphic correlations.

Trilobites had three body lobes, two of which lay on each side of a longitudinal axial lobe. The trilobite body was segmented and divided into three regions from head to tail: the cephalon, or head region, separated from the thorax, which was followed in turn by the pygidium, or tail region. Trilobites, like other arthropods, had an external skeleton, called exoskeleton, composed of chitinous material. For the animal to grow, the exoskeleton had to be shed, and shed trilobite exoskeletons, or portions of them, are fossils that are relatively common.

Each trilobite body segment bore a pair of jointed appendages. The forwardmost appendages were modified into sense and feeding organs. Most trilobites had a pair of <u>compound</u> eyes; some of them, however, were eyeless. Some trilobites were active predators, whereas others were scavengers, and still others probably ate <u>plankton</u>. Some trilobites grew to large size; *Paradoxides harlani*, which has been found near Boston in rocks of the Middle Cambrian Epoch (521 million to 501 million years ago), grew to be more than 45 cm (18 inches) in length and may have weighed as much as 4.5 kg (10 pounds). Others were small.
