CFMS SCHOLARSHIP

The following is an excerpt from a letter written by Elmer Parsons to Merle Howe:

The following is a brief history of the CFMS Scholarship.

At the Convention meeting in 1974, Claude Schapers presented some ideas for a scholarship fund. A "Feasibility Committee" was appointed to consolidate the ideas.

On July 3, 1976, a new committee was appointed to prepare the Operating Regulations for the Scholarship Fund. At the November 13, 1976 business meeting, the Operating Regulations were adopted and Toy Sato was selected as chairman.

Thru 1977, 1978, and 1979 the Contributions continued to increase substantially and the Fund had reached a level in which it was possible to give at least two student grants each year.

In 1978, the first Honoree (ed. note.: Honoree is not student receiving loan) was selected by the CFMS Scholarship Committee and the following is a list of Southern California Universities or Colleges that were selected.

Method of Selecting Honoree

Criteria for selection

The person(s) selected to be honored shall have made great contributions toward the realizations of the avowed purpose and goals of the CFMS. The Honoree may or may not be a member of the CFMS society. The Honoree may receive this award only once.

Time of selection

The Honoree shall be selected by the Scholarship Committee prior to March 1st of each year, be notified of the selection, plus the duties involved, as soon as possible. The Honoree may receive this honor only once.

Duties

The Honoree shall select the school(s) at the college or University level, within the territorial jurisdiction of the CFMS, which shall receive the Scholarshp Grants and shall participate with the schools in the selection of the student awardee(s). The honoree shall report to the Directors at the Convention Meeting the name of the student awardee(s).

PROGRAM

Herb Beckman reports that tonight Marvin and Jacque Mog will tell us about their experiences in Australia and show slides of their trip.

For the coming year he has Jesse Hardman, Marie Brashears, and Carl Ortega lined up. These people will all have something of interest to share with us.

TOPAZ AND CITRINE

Topaz, a hydrous aluminum silicate forms in crystals, some as large as 600 pounds. The color is highly variable and can be altered by heat treating. The largest and finest crystals come from Brazil and Siberia. Deep yellow gem materials come from Burma and Sri Lanka.

Clear or finely colored varieties have always been used as gems. The deep golden yellow variety is most highly prized, although blue or green stones are also popular.

In the jewelry trade many faceted yellow stones are known as topaz, but are really citrine. So what of citrine? It is a light golden crystalline quartz, probably colored by a slight trace of ferric iron. Spanish topaz and Saxon topaz are names given to the deep reddish or orange colored type of citrine.

Citrine, like many stones can be heat treated to change the color. Russian peasants of the the province of Perm, where smoky quartz crystals are found, are accustomed to alter them to a deep yellow by baking the crystals in loaves of bread. If the color is not sufficiently changed by the first baking, the treatment is repeated until the desired color is attained or stone given up as hopeless.

LAPIDARY HINTS: Malachite. We recommend sawing about 10 degrees away from directly parallel to the grain. This way, when you dome the stone, you will get a bullseye effect. Malachite is a fairly soft stone, so try to leave the slabs thicker than other material. When grinding, we recommend always wearing a breathing mask. Malachite can be toxic and can make you ill. After grinding, sand with a new 600 sanding belt, then a worn out 600. Finally, for polishing, we recommend ZAM on hard felt.


