Amethyst, the gemstone believed by ancient Greeks and Romans to ward off the intoxicating powers of Bacchus, also is said to keep the wearer clear-headed and quick-witted. Throughout history, the gemstone has been associated with many myths, legends, religions, and numerous cultures. English regalia were even decorated with amethysts during the Middle Ages to symbolize royalty. It has

been associated with many myths, legends, religions, and numerous cultures. Amethyst is purple quartz, a beautiful blend of violet and red that can found in every corner of the earth. Historically, the finest amethyst were found in Russia and were featured in much royal European jewelry. Today, while Brazil is the primary source of this gemstone, fine material can be found elsewhere, especially in Zambia.

Quartz (Amethyst) is a low pressure/temperature polymorph of SiO2. At high temperatures, quartz exists in the beta form, with hexagonal symmetry. At lower temperatures there is a displacive phase transition to a distorted structure with trigonal symmetry (alpha form).

FEBRUARY 20 AND 21, 2010 FIELD TRIP

Marble Mountains and Siam Siding

The February 20-21st field trip will be to the Marble Mts. for Garnets[not large ones] green Epidote, Hematite and calcite crystals. Saturday after noon we can look for Trilobites near where we camp. The

Sunday trip will be to the Siam Siding area for Chapenite. Herb can show us his technique for probing the sand for Chapenite.

To get to the campsite take I-15 to Barstow and then I-40 to Ludlow. At Ludlow take the National Trails Highway (old Highway 66) to Chambless, 10.5 miles past Amboy. Turn Right on Cadiz Rd. and go aprox. 2.5 miles to the railroad crossing. DO NOT cross the railroad but turn left on the dirt road and go aprox. 1/2 mile to the campsite. There will be Searcher signs to help you.


It will be a dry camp so bring plenty of water. There will be a pot luck on Saturday night. Bring your favorite dish and wood for the camp fire if you can.

Tools needed are rock hammer, rock pick, small sledge and chisel. For the Trilobites a rock hammer and sharp chisel or old knife for splitting the shale rocks. For the Chapenite, a 4 foot long 1/4 to 3/8 inch metal rod with a handle on one end or a clam rake if available. Also a long handled shovel may be helpful.



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Happy Valentine's Day, February 14



Every February, across the country, candy, flowers, and gifts are exchanged between loved ones, all in the name of St. Valentine. But who is this mysterious saint and why do we celebrate this holiday? The history of Valentine's Day — and its patron saint — is shrouded in mystery. But we do know that February has long been a month of romance. St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. So, who was Saint Valentine and how did he become associated with this ancient rite? Today, the Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred.

One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men — his crop of potential soldiers. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.
