MAY "LONG RANGE" FIELD TRIP:

We will be rockhounding in Northeastern California and Central Oregon. Meeting at the first camping spot, Lassen Creek Campground, just north of Davis Creek, CA on May 25th Memorial Day Weekend. It is approximately 725 miles to the Davis Creek area. This area is about 22 miles north of Alturas on Highway 395 you will go through Davis Creek, your next landmark. Pay close attention and don't blink or you'll miss it, there is not much there! Eleven miles further, north of Davis Creek the highway crosses Lassen Creek. You will be driving alongside of Goose Lake and starting down a slightgrade. LOOK FOR THE SMALL, DIRT WILLOW RANCH ROAD ON YOUR RIGHT. Drive on this road about 5.5 miles in a generally south by southeasterly direction to the turnoff to the Lassen Creek Campground (Note: at the first crossroad, about 3 miles, go straight ahead) take a RIGHT turn and cross Lassen Creek and you'll see the campground almost immediately on your LEFT. There is springwater and one outdoor privy.

Elsewhere in this bulletin is a rough itinerary. This is the last bulletin prior to the trip. Note that some camping locations are still open. It's also possible dates may change. I'd like some flexibility, since often we get to a location we may want to stay longer or leave earlier depending on material, availability or weather.

If anyone is planning on meeting us part way through the trip please let me know so we can make special arrangements.

Two of the stops, Davis Creek and Glass Buttes, are for obsidian. This is volcanic glass. Don't forget, gloves, and safety glasses, this is sharp stuff. Shovels and a short pry bar would be helpful. Davis Creek area is in a heavily timbered area.

Eveyone digging obsidian in the Davis Creek/Lassen Creek area will need to have a Forest Service permit with them. I have a supply of forms to fill out when we get there.

So far we have seven rigs confirmed. If there are others please let me know by May 14th.


