LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM

There is gold in Orange County!!! Our May speaker, James Klein, spoke to us about the fundamentals of prospecting, where to look for gold, and related some stories from the old gold rush days.

The basic tool for prospecting is and always has been your gold pan. We saw and held numerous samples of the different gold pans on the market today. We learned that small pans are easier to handle just because they don't hold as much material as large pans and you don't get tired as fast. In the old days the metal gold pans were used for everything—panning gold, cooking over a fire, and as a dish from which to eat.

Rockers or rocking the cradle involves shoveling material onto the screen, ladle water onto it, and rock it. The finer material goes down the sluice and is trapped on miner's moss or rubber mats. One theory regarding "The Golden Fleece" was that a sheepskin was used in place of miner's moss in a rocker thus filling the fleece full of gold.

The California gold rush was the first free man's gold rush which meant that you could work where you wanted, what you wanted, and how much you wanted. In those early days in the beginning everywhere was so rich. An amazing number of well-known names in California got their start with goldmining.

Sluices, dry washers, and electrostatic separation which is a dry washer that charges the gold so it can't get out of the box are some other prospecting tools. There are all kinds of contraptions out there for gold prospecting so you have to be wary of scams.

Nugget shooting is very popular. This is gold prospecting with a metal detector. Metal detectors have become to sophisticated that they are capable of telling you what denomination a coin is and how deep it is. Some detectors even talk. There are black sand detectors and where you have black sand there generally is gold. There is one computerized detector that uses a scanner and a computer with a monitor that is worn like a harness. It tells you everything that is buried in the ground. It sells for \$13,000.

The San Gabriel River is the most popular spot for gold prospecting in Southern California. You can sell your gold to goldsmiths and gold prospecting stores. Nuggets and jewelry rock sells for at least double what gold bullion sells for on the market.

Gold is durable, beautiful, recyclable and valuable. That's why we're out there prospecting!

JUNE FIELD TRIP

The June field trip will be a one-day field trip on June 17th to the east fork of the San Gabriel River in the San Gabriel Mts. To get there from Orange County go to the 210 Fwy. and take Hwy. 39, Azusa Blvd. North. You will come to a "Y", take the left road and follow it into the San Gabriel Cyn. To East Fork Rd., turn right and follow it past Williams Camp to Oaks Picnic area. The distance is about 45 miles from Fullerton, an hour drive. Since this a one-day trip and we will miss our traditional potluck Saturday night dinner, bring something simple (that can be eaten cold) for a potluck lunch that we can all share. We want the lunch to be quick to that we can get back to prospecting. There are barbecue grills in the picnic area, so some might want to linger for dinner and there is also a restaurant at Camp Williams. Bring drinking water. There are restrooms available. Dress for warm-to-hot and sun. Wear foot gear that can get wet or high enough to keep your feet dry. Expect to get wet! THIS is a SWIFT WATER RIVER, so you should be able to SWIM!!! If not swimming, consider wearing a PFD if you plan on working in or near the water. The same goes for children. Equipment: gold pan, classifier 1/4-inch and/or 1/2-inch, shovel, 5 and/or 2-1/2 gallon buckets, small vial, sluice if you have one. Gold dredge o.k., too. I will be bringing my sluice and set it up as a community effort; those that help get their share of the gold. Keep your day job. If you need supplies, I suggest Pedersen's at 2521 N. 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TRADITIONAL JUNE BIRTHSTONE - ALEXANDRITE

Alexandrite was originally discovered and mined in Russia, and is also found in Ceylon, Sri Lanka, Zimbabwe, and Brazil. Very rare and expensive, most alexandrite exhibits color changing properties and will appear green in natural lighting, and red/purple under artificial lighting. For alexandrite, the quality of the color change is paramount. White the "holy grail" is a gem whose color changes like a traffic light from green to red, such a stone has yet to be found. In fine examples, the change is typically one from a slightly bluish green to a purplish red. The quality of color change is often referred to by dealers in a percentage basis, with 100% change being the ideal. Stones that display a change of 30% of less are of marginal interest and are arguably not even alexandrite. Significant brown or gray components in either of the twin colors will lower value dramatically. Alexandrite was discovered in 1830 in Csarist Russia, and named after Csar Alexander II for his 21st birthday. Alexandrite is considered important for gamblers. When worn near the heart it is to bring luck in love, and said to have a positive effect on the nervous system and glandular system.
