Not just any rocks for sale_

A 104-lb. piece of quartz, formerly on loan to the Smithsonian Institution's Museum of Natural History for more than a decade, will be among those offered for sale by the Defense National Stockpile Center at the 1994 Gem, Mineral, Fossil and Jewelry Show in Tucson, Ariz.

Marking a departure from past practices, DNSC contracting officers will be on-hand to write and process orders on-the-spot. "DNSC is in the process of changing its business practices in order to better accommodate customer needs," said Richard J. Connelly, DNSC administrator, "and this is one of the new approaches we are taking in response to feedback we've received from our customers."

The 104-lb. champagne-colored crystal is one of 9,968 pieces currently owned by DNSC, which has been authorized by the U.S. Congress to sell 800,000 pounds of quartz during fiscal year 1994. Quartz was originally stockpiled by DNSC during and after World War II for optical and


electronic uses. DNSCowned quartz was purchased from Brazil in the 1940s and 1950s. Since that time, however, natural quartz has been supplanted by cultured quartz.

Currently, DNSC is offering for sale grade 1 and grade 2, faced or unfaced crystals weighing from 200 to 10,000+ grams. Grade 1 crystals are free from all defects such as optical twinning, inclusions, needles, color and Tyndall effect that can be ordinarily detected in an

oil bath when examined with polarized light and with moderate arc-lamp illumination.

Grade 2 crystals may contain inclusions such as all types of hard and soft blue needles; color, including color phantoms; Tyndall effect; and scattered fine or small inclusions—specks or points—in the usable portion when examined with moderate arc-lamp illumination.

Faced crystals, 200 grams or larger,

have at least one identifiable natural face, a side (prism) or a cap (pyramid), with an area three-fourths square inch or larger.

Stockpile quartz crystals are coded according to weight, grade, usability and crystal structure. A code such as S-16-F signifies a 500 to 700 gram Grade 1 crystal with a usability of 60-100 percent that is a faced crystal.

SHOW TALK


The March 16th show meeting presented a picture of an activity well under way. We have 32 cases signed up, with room for several more.


It was reported that the Center has added more tables to their inventory so we can rent fewer from an outside agency.

Our first show was held in 1960 at the Optimist Club in Anaheim. At that time there were a few displays, and only one dealer.

The show has grown every year since. Every one goes on like a well oiled machine regardless of what has gone on behind the scenes.

One year at the Retail Clerks we set up a table with literature and a petition against the BLM closing of the desert. We were asked to "Cease and Desist". We did.

Some of you will remember the day Fergie was working the swap table, when a young man liked one of the stones so much he wanted to take it outside in the sun for a better view. That's the last time Fergie saw the stone or the young man.

Then there was the time Dennis VanKampen purchased a beautiful fire agate only to lose it. He spent most of Saturday looking, but not finding it. On Sunday night, during tear down of the show, there was his stone. It had rolled under a dealer's table. A very elated man was Dennis

SHOW TIME Con't

Our <u>BIG SHOW</u> was Fantasy of Gems held in 1972 at the Anaheim Convention Center. It was a combination California and American Federation show. The committee of 27 Searchers worked for three years to present this show. The time spent proved to be very rewarding. The attendance for the three day show was over 28,000. We had 101 dealers, some are still with us. A total of 540 cases were shown by our members and Federation members from across the country.

One of our guest displays was the head of Christ, carved from one single crystal. The display had an appraised value of \$750,000.00. A guard was on duty at all times.

We were the first in Southern California to display the "Moom Rock." It was quite a responsibility for Jessie Vance who was in charge of it. Each night she tucked it in the vault, and each morning she got it out again. Jessie had a guard with her at all times, also we had to have one standing in front of the case.

Some of the things we offered our guests: A daily field trip for which we provided buses to the collection areas which were mostly in the desert. We also provided a camping area at the Orange County Fair grounds and ran a shuttle bus back and forth every hour for three days.

The icing on the cake was our first prize donation ticket, a new 18 foot travel trailer. Luckily the winner-lived in this area, although we had a lot of offers to deliver it across country.

This show is still considered to be one of the best shows ever.

When our Searcher show moved to the Brookhurst Center, Ray and Ester, one of our dealers, parked their RV in the parking lot, only to be rudely awakened at 4 AM by a sprinkler aimed at their trailer.

In 1975 the kitchen had a real mystery--Who scorched the hot dogs? We still don't know!

Ten years ago we celebrated our 25th Anniversary. A big reunion was held and past members were invited to attend. We had 100 plus Searchers from Southern California, Northern California, Arizona and Oklahoma. It was great seeing our old friends again.

The last time Merle was show chairman he forgot to go to the Anaheim Citu Hall to get all the licenses and permits that were needed to open the show. After a mad rush on Friday morning, he was able to get everything under control.

Can't forget the time the Friday Night Dinner was stew. Janet spent all day Thursday cooking stew, but when she got ready to serve on Friday night, the stew had fermented. The garbage disposal ate well.

This year's Show Chairman is well known for the tears he shed while chopping onions in the kitchen. Soon after that show he was presented with a pregnant onion plant. We've always thought a lot of Floyd.

One of the tragic things that happened was the time Jay showed his opals. The night guards neglected to turn the case lights off and Jay lost three beautiful opals.

OPAL MOUNTAIN/INSCRIPTION CANYON FIELD TRIP

April 16 - 17, 1994

Take I-15 to Barstow RR (Barstow). Turn left; go to Main Street and turn left. At first street, turn right and go to Irwin Rd. Follow Irwin Road to Copper City Road (about 6 miles from town). Turn left one mile past Owl Canyon/Rainbow Basin sign. Go about 5-1/2 miles down Copper City Road (dirt road). Camp is on left side of Copper City Road.

What to Bring: Food, water, wood and essentials.

What to Collect: Green, orange, white and cherry common opals, apache tears, and banded rhyolite.

For more details, refer to Mary F. Strong's *Desert Gem Trails*. Trip will include a hike/drive to two petroglyph locations. Primitive campground. Graded dirt road to campsite; 4 X 4 or high-clearance vehicles recommended to dig sites.
