Our April program will be a one-hour presentation by Helga and Werner Wagener on the "Introduction into the Basics of Identification of Petrified Wood." They will be explaining the wood structure and difference in conifers and dicots which are leaf-bearing trees by using a microscope. Discussion will continue with how petrification may occur, age of different formations, particularly in the western United States, plus some oddities of fossilized wood.

Helga Wagener says, "My husband and I joined the South Bay Lapidary & Mineral Society in Torrance in the summer of '89. A presentation on petrified wood by Walton Wright the following spring hooked me on petrified wood. I have been collecting and trying to identify it ever since. At the present I have over 90 species of identified trees and over 1,400 pieces catalogued as to species and, if available, the locality and age. My husband has cut and/or polished most of our collection. Our "Museum" is open to people who are interested in this hobby. In the meantime, I have also collected unusual pieces or, as I call them, 'Character Pieces'."

If you love petrified wood, have a curiosity about it, or simply do not know anything about it, this program sounds like it should fill all those needs. Please join us Tuesday night, April 10, for a fascinating and informative evening.

APRIL FIELD TRIP

APRIL 14 & 15, 2007 By Robert Burson

Our April trip will be to St. Augustine Pass and Black Hills in the Wiley's Well/Chuckwalla Mountain. St. Augustine Pass is in a secluded pristine area. I am hoping for assistance from nature to bring a good bit of rain so one can journey with a camera in-hand. There are many amygdules. Some are solid, some have many colors of the rainbow, some have sagenite. There are some other seam agate materials as well. This portion of the trip is a bit challenging, although my wife negotiated this terrain with a small stock pick-up truck. I just want to give a heads-up for those of faint of heart. There are many other areas to choose from for those who many not wish to drive in to the pass. One location that we will travel to is the Strawbeds in the Black Hills. This again is a fairly long dirt road. I would rate this a moderately good dirt road with only a few tough spots. There should not be any problems with soft ground, only a matter of clearance. This is a remote beautiful location. It is an intact geological area. This allows for the instruction of what a geode bed looks like before it has been heavily excavated. There is still much material on the surface and a choice of many places to discover a valuable find. The hike many be considered somewhat strenuous. It is recommended that protective clothing, sunglasses, hat, good hiking shoes, hiking stick, a backpack and water be taken on the trip. The lighter you travel the further you can hike into the hills. This can be a fascinating place to explore.

Camping at Geode Road is approximately 1/2 mile west of Wiley's Well Road. The location is at Imperial County line. Motels are numerous in Blythe and a few in Palo Verde approximately 20 miles away.

Start time is 9:00 AM from base camp both Saturday and Sunday. Saturday night will be the usual campfire and potluck. Field Trip contact phone number is 562-706-2054.

<u>APRIL BIRTHSTONE –</u> <u>DIAMOND</u>

Diamond is the ultimate gemstone, having few weaknesses and many strengths. It is well known that diamond is the hardest substance found in nature, but few people realize that diamond is four times harder than the next hardest natural mineral, corundum (sapphire and ruby). But even as hard as it is, it is not impervious. Diamond has four directions of cleavage, meaning that if it receives a sharp blow in one of these directions it will cleave, or split. A skilled diamond setter and/or jeweler will prevent any of these directions from being in a position to be struck while mounted in a jewelry piece. As a gemstone, its single flaw (perfect cleavage) is far outdistanced by the sum of its positive qualities. It has a broad color range, high refraction, high dispersion or fire, very low reactivity to chemicals, rarity, and of course, extreme hardness and durability. Diamond conducts heat better than anything – five times better than the second best element, silver. This characteristic is the basis for "diamond tests," as it is simple and cannot be faked. Diamonds are found in a type of rock call "kimberlite," which comprises the core of certain volcanoes over especially thick portions of the earth's crust. This hard stone is mined and then crushed between giant steel rollers. The kimberlite is reduced to fine gravel, yet the extremely hard diamonds come out unharmed. Water is added and a grease-covered roller sorts the diamonds from the gravel, as the diamonds stick to the grease. Typically, a single carat of diamond is recovered from a ton of ore.
