Castle Buttes/Mojave Desert Field Trip

Feb. 22-23, 2014 Robert Burson Trip leader

This collecting area is reasonably close to the L.A. metro complex, two hours and change. The area contains a good cross section of the Mojave Desert geology. The mega borate mines, glacial lake deposits and some volcanics make this an interesting field trip. Possible collecting locations are Sierra Coloma for onyx; Castle Buttes for jasper, palm and scattered agate; borate minerals at US Borax; and last but not least petrified horse tail reed at Brown Buttes. This gives us a lot of possibilities for fun collecting.

Dry camping is available at the Sierra Poloma claim, which is approximately ten miles North of the 58 freeway on Clay Mine Road. Searchers signs will lead you to the camping area. For those who wish to stay in motels there are a few in Boron.

We will leave the campsite @ 9:00am Saturday and Sunday morning. You will want to bring lunch with you as we probably won't return to camp until the afternoon. This is a moderate off road area and 4 x4 is recommended, but skilled drivers in high clearance 2 wheel drive vehicles should be OK.

We will have the usual campfire and potluck on Saturday night; bring your favorite campsite dish.

Digging equipment: shovel, 8lb sledge hammer (for the Sierra Poloma travertine), rock pick, and collecting bag. Attire: boots, hat, sun screen. Also remember this is a dry campsite with no facilities, so bring everything you need including water.

Directions: From Anaheim Center, go east on 91 north 215, to Cajon Summit, about 5 miles take 395 split, 45 - 50m, to Clay Mine Rd. Look for searcher signs to camp.

In the Shop: Cutting Geodes

Cutting geodes is always a little tricky since they are so round and hard to hold in place to cut in a slab saw. There are probably dozens of ways that rock hounds have come up with that works for them, from simple to complex tools. Here is one simple way to cut geodes in a 10" saw. Notches have been cut in the wood. Different sizes could be created for different size geodes if needed.

In the Field: Notes on Having a Great Field Trip

We are starting a new year of rock collecting so some thoughts on field trips from our Field trip coordinator seemed like a good way to start this column.

Here, in no particular order, are some thoughts about field trips:

- Most trips are for the weekend, although there are some 1 day trips, and some longer ones
- Most campsites are dry campsites (no facilities, no water etc)
- Campsites are usually accessible by any vehicle. Some people tent camp, some sleep in their pickups, some sleep in their RVs, and some sleep back in town at the nearest motel
- Sat night there is a potluck and campfire.
- Collecting trips may require high clearance or 4x4 vehicles, if you don't have one we will carpool you with someone

• Your most used tools will be a rock pick and a spray bottle, this is enough for most trips. When this is not enough you may want sledges, gads, shovels etc. I have found that backpacks are the most convenient way to carry rocks, although you will see many other methods being used.

- I like shoes with stiff soles (as compared to soft soled running shoes), but the soft soles will work
- Glasses to protect your eyes from flying chips should be worn. Hats and gloves are good.
- Sun screen and water are necessary. Snacks when out collecting are good.
- You won't see many critters, and most want nothing more than to be left alone, be careful reaching into holes, under bushes etc. Don't mess with a rattlesnake.
- Many places have been picked over some, that just means that you need to work harder to find good stuff. Look under bushes, on the side of step hills, etc. Wherever no one looked before.
- Not sure what you are looking for? Ask someone. We will all be glad to help you.
- It never hurts to follow the field trip leader's recommendations about how and where to collect.
- Realize that although finding rocks is certainly the goal, half the fun is in just being out there and spending some time with friends.
- Leave the collecting site cleaner than you found it.
- Fill in holes, if that is not possible slope the sides so that a critter that falls in can get out.
- Don't pick up or bother a tortoise, you will literally scare the pee out of them, and with the loss of that liquid they run the risk of dying of dehydration
- Drink lots of water, and pace yourself. It is easy to become dehydrated.
- Do show your rocks to others, at the trucks, at the campsite etc. We do like to look at rocks
- Bring along friends. You do not have to be a Searcher to come on one of our trips. You will need to sign a waiver.
- Once you have found all these cool rocks there is the question of what to do with them. You can certainly have the coolest yard in the neighborhood (or at least the most rocky), but learning to work the rocks will increase your enjoyment of them. The club workshop is the perfect place to learn how to work with rocks.

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• When you are out collecting in the desert you may notice the lack of something: noise. Pause for a moment and enjoy it. Take a second to renew your connection with Pachamama (the earth Mother).

• It is nice to find a great rock, but it is really nice to give that rock to a youngster or rockhounding newbie and watch their eyes light up.

- Breaking out of your everyday routine, and getting out of the city is good
- Finding rocks in the parking lot is good. Finding rocks in the road is good (literally "in" the road)

• Telling stories about the nice rocks you have found is acceptable, telling stories about the great rocks is encouraged.

• I find that when I arrive at a site I am not "seeing" the rocks well, but as some time goes by, and my mind slows down, and I find a few examples, all of a sudden it seems like I can see all the good ones

- The driving can be exciting, collecting requires a different pace
- When traveling to collecting sites we will convoy. There are rules to convoying:
- O Try not to lose sight of the person behind you

O Definitely to not pass an intersection until the person behind you has caught up to the point that they will be able to see which direction you take

Field trips are one of the great things the Searchers has to offer you. You really ought to take advantage of them, we have a lot of fun.
