Marvin Mog had a "Show 'N Tell" table featuring some richly colored wonderstone from Fallon, Nevada. This really made you realize why it is called wonderstone. There was rattlesnake jasper from Cove Fort, Utah and agate/jasper from Hart Mountain, Oregon. Marvin also reported that while he and Jacque were on their extended summer trip there was some diamond mining in Canada located near Yellow Knife, a town north of Edmondton. There is no road to this location unless during the winter conditions they have an "ice" road. There are several lakes in the area and the diamonds are in the Kimberlight tubes under the lakes. Arrangements are being made to drain the lakes but before this happens the Indians are to be allowed to "fish out" the lakes. The Australian owners of the mineral rights are finding that in 800 tons they are finding one kilo (2.2 pounds) of 10 percent gemstone quality diamonds.

The CFMS Directors Fall Meeting was held in Visalia, November 14, 1998. Meeting was called to order by CFMS President, Beverly Moreau. Formalities were completed. There were 93 directors and 16 officers and chairmen present. A quorum was established. An Agenda was adopted. Minutes of the July 2, 1998 meeting read, corrected, accepted and approved.

The 1998 CFMS Show in Monterey was reported to be a successful show and a check in the amount of \$7,170.87 was presented to the Federation for their share of the show.

The 1999 CFMS Show and Convention will be held at the Stanislaus County Fairgrounds in Turlock, CA, from June 18 thru June 20th, 1999, hosted by the Mother Lode Mineral Society. A representative of the Modesto Convention and Visitors Bureau gave a brief presentation of activities and things to see and do for visitors to the Turlock area. The location is part of the historic Mother Lode country and there is no shortage of mining towns to visit.

The 2000 CFMS Show and Convention will return to Riverside Convention Center and will be hosted by the Valley Prospectors, the first weekend in August of 2000. There were no new sho bids but a group in Las Vegas is still giving some serious consideration for the year 2001.

### FEDERATION DELEGATE REPORT (Cont'd):

There were two delinquet Societies as of November 1, 1998, the Glendale/ Verdugo Gem and Mineral Society and VIP Gem and Mineral Society. Disbanded Societies: Mother Lode Mineralites, San Dieguito Gem and Mineral Society and San Fernando Valley Gem and Mineral.

Isabella Burns will be California's Representative to the American Federation and President-Elect to the AFMS in year 2000.

CFMS is about to launch its new Web Site. Directors approved the concept unamiously. Content will be controlled by an appointed Committee to assure that nothing which places the Federation in a negative light is ever posted on the Site. An Intenet Committee was immediatly established and they will proceed to make the necessary arrangements with a Service Provider. It is hoped that CFMS will have its own Web Page set up by January. A more complete explanation will be given as details are worked out.

Insurance this year will be \$1.00 per member (no change). This is in addition to the \$1.50dues we pay to CFMS for each Searcher member.

The CFMS Earth Science Committee reported that the April 11 - 18, 1999 Seminar at ZZYZX Road, Soda Springs, CA is almost full. There are a few openings left but they are expected to be taken soon. The Committee is already making plans for Camp Paradise Seminar (September 12 - 19, 1999). A Wood Seminar will be offered at Paradise this year but restricted to 30 people. The instructor will be Walt Wright. Participants in the Wood Seminarwould not be attending the other classes that are taught in camp. Classes are a full 8 hours. Programs well be held each evening. There will be more information on this in the CFMS Bulletin.

The CFMS Endowment Fund now has over \$134,000. Only the interest may be used. A healthy financial future for the California Federation depends on the income generated by this fund. For those of you who do not know, the Searchers became a Patron Member years ago (our plaque is the third one on the panel). For a club to become a patron a minimum of \$100 plus \$1 dollar for each member must be donated. Since we are a patron perhaps it is time for the Searchers to donate another \$100 during 1999. Any individual may become a patron with a minimum donation of \$100. Donations are tax deductible! The greater the principal, the greater the amounts available for Federation programs. Checks may be made out to CFMS Endowment Fund and mailed to Renata Bever, Executive Secretary/Treasurer, CFMS.

#### SHOP HINTS:

# FIRESCALE INHIBITOR:

Firescale is cupric oxide formed during soldering when the copper in sterling silver combines with oxygen in the atmosphere. To make firescale inhibitor, use boric acid (granular) and denatured alcohol. Add boric acid to alcohol until it stops dissolving and makes a thin paste. Place mixture into a large-mouth glass jar with a tight cap.

To apply to work, shake and stir mixture. Then dip work into mixture with tongs or tweezers. After coating the work with the mixture, move work to soldering screen. Be careful not to remove any of the mixture from the work. Use your torch to ignite the alcohol in the mixture. After burning for a few seconds, the flame will go out and the work will be coated with dried boric acid. This will seal the work from oxygen and thus prevent firescale.




