### **Clear Creek Management Area Field Trip**

Hobby gem and mineral collectors are drawn to the Clear Creek areas by the presence of over 150 semi-precious mineral and gemstones. This is one of the most highly mineralized areas in California. The serpentine mass contains two superfund sites, Atlas Mine and Johns-Mansville. Both were associated with the mining and processing of chrysotile asbestos. Other minerals mined from the serpentine mass included cinnabar, chromite, magnesite, and jadeite. The Gem mine (private) located within the serpentine mass is the only source of gem-grade benitoite in the world. They have a fee dig in the tailings if you are interested, but we will not be going on that trip. The rare minerals neptunite and joaquinite have also been found there. Other cool things to hound are jaspers, uvarovite, and plasma agate. We'll do a combination of digging for plasma agate and scouring the stream beds for interesting finds. You can't be disappointed in such a geologically diverse place! Please RSVP if you plan to attend.

**Permits Needed** Get your permits ahead of time by visiting the follow site, each car needs a general access permit to CCMA and a special permit for the Serpentine Area (ACEC). <u>https://www.recreation.gov/vehiclepermits/250848</u>

Clear Creek Vehicle Permit: \$5 per week\* Serpentine Area of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC) Permit: Free, limited to 5 entries per calendar year, per person\* \*Each permit requires a \$6 reservation fee. We will also need a gate code; Margaret will send that information out before the trip.

**Directions:** I recommend using the "download offline maps" feature for Google Maps or your own selection of GPS App which allows off grid maps. **There isn't much for cell service in the area.** 

Coming North on I-5: Take exit 325 for Jayne Ave (Rt 33) and go west toward Coalinga. Jayne Ave turns into Polk St thru the town of Coalinga and then turns back into Jayne Ave Continue on Jayne Ave and it make a big right sweeping turn and turns into S. Derrick Ave and you are in the middle of the Chevron Oil Field, go ~4miles. Turn left onto Lost Gatos Creek Rd. Follow for 21.5mi, turns into Coalinga Rd at the Condon Peak Recreation Area. Continue another 8.6mi and turn right onto Clear Creek Rd (LOOK FOR SEARCHERS SIGN) Pass over the ford in the San Benito River. Travel about 2.3 miles, the left just before the locked gate to head up to Jade Mill Campground (36.368356 N, -120.754140 W), SEARCHERS signs will be posted.

### Camp is approximately 6 hrs from Orange County.

The camp is a dry camp, bring everything you need.

**Tools:** You may want heavy tools for the Plasma Agate, as some of it is in boulders you will need to break up if you want to take some. For the stream collecting a rock pick and a spray bottle will suffice.

**Vehicles:** Although we will be on dirt roads, a high clearance vehicle is still recommended. If you come to camp in a car, we will have you carpool with someone for the collecting.

**Potluck On Sat night** we will have our standard potluck, bring something to share if you wish to participate. If campfires are allowed in Sept please bring so bring some firewood if you are able.

### **Clear Creek Rocks and Minerals**

Searchers will be taking a field trip to the Clear Creek area in September, 2022. You might want to do some reading about Clear Creek materials before you go.

The Clear Creek area features serpentinite, blueschist, schist, quartz and plasma agate, and many minerals. Plasma agate may contain quartz, cinnabar and other minerals, giving it a variety of colors. Due to the presence of asbestos, access to the area is monitored and caution must be taken. Be sure to follow the directions and registration process for permits when we release the field trip information.

rt395 did some research before going to Clear Creek, so they were looking for specific mines and mine sites in blueschist and serpentinite. While expoloring rt395 found green uvarovite (a chromium garnet), purple kammererite (a chromium clinochlore), and coalingite. They also found a small quantity of benitoite in stream beds below a claimed mine. Green andradite garnets were also found. You can see photos at the website listed above. There are many potential minerals there!

### **Exploring in Central Washington State**

We were in central Washington state and explored two sites in the Gem Trails of Washington book. From the Seattle area, we took 90 east and at Cle Elum we switched to the 970 east. From there we took the 97 north at Virden. We camped at a National Forest campground off of Liberty road. It was extensive with many sites, most empty and had two pit toilets. There were numerous gold mines, some active, nearby, and the roads were also OHV trails. It looks like the camp is also a hunters camp during the hunting season. We drove through the little town of Liberty where there were some interesting historic buildings and the beginnings of a tourist destination based on the mining history.

Our first site was the agate site near First Creek. We parked near 97 and hiked up FR 3506. The book said 1.5 miles. We were in forest with First Creek rushing by at the bottom of the canyon. Gradually, we hiked away from the creek, climbing a little higher. The book said to look for a 50 yard scramble uphill, which I didn't see until we were well up on the trail. We saw quite a few diggings but no rocks of interest. If you do a Google image search for First Creek, Washington, you can see some pretty agates and crystals. Some agates are blueish in color, but they are not the famous Ellensburg Blue agate. We did finally find a scramble but felt too decrepit to attempt it. What we saw the most of was butterflies and wildflowers. We did enjoy a virtuous hike and hope you have better luck!

Our second site was Red Top. We traveled s little further north on 97 and followed the well-marked FR roads to the Red Top parking lot. This is a beautiful drive! There are a few camping sites near the parking lot and a pit toilet. We hiked the two-mile well-marked trail to the agate beds, often seeing the Red Top fire lookout above us to the right. The hike had interesting rock formations which changed over the trail, some meadows full of flowers and mosquitoes. We stupidly left our repellant in the truck and were followed and covered with clouds of mosquitoes, but did not get bitten. I can't explain this. The old agate beds are at GPS 47.3061, -120.7602. We saw lots of evidence of digging, but no scraps. We could hear someone digging down the slope. Found here are agates and geodes. A Google image search will inspire you. We loved the hike but didn't do any digging.

These trips made me appreciate how visible and productive Searcher field trips are. With little plant cover in the desert, it is easy to see the matrix and any geologic clues without having to clear duff, soil, plants, etc. out of the way.

There are multiple sites in the book for the Yakima River a little south along the 10, but it was very full, and there weren't any beaches or gravel bars.

I hope you can do some exploring soon! Margaret Hogarth




