



Join us on Sat-Sun, December 6th and 7th, 2025 as we explore the Castle Butte area near Boron. We will be exploring the Castle Butte area with petrified palm, agate, jasper and perhaps some bloodstone. The Sierra Palona Travertine mine will be on the itinerary this time if there is enough interest. We might also add the Borax Mine Museum. While any vehicle can reach the camping area, the rockhounding will require high clearance vehicles, 4x4 recommended. For any who don't camp, this is a great day trip or lodging is available in Boron or Barstow.

Saturday and Sunday, meet at 8:30 a.m. at our campsite on Clay Mine Road, where the road makes a 90 degree turn

(Searchers and friends). Our campsite is marked with a star on the map, just

before Aerial Acres. All vehicles can reach our meeting spot. This is a dry camping site without any amenities. Please bring all food and water that you may need and dress in layers appropriate for the weather.

On Sunday, meet at 8:30 a.m. at our campsite on Clay Mine Road. We will be exploring nearby jasperagate sites.

Allow 2-1/2 hours from Anaheim; it is about 130 miles.

Burro Creek Field Trip Report

Hello fellow Searchers and Rock Hound friends.

Today is Friday, November 7th....we start our journey from our dry campsite from a dirt road 2 miles past the 'Nothing' sign off the 93 hwy. We ventured forward about 4 miles to a fork (turn left) through a small scenic canyon, then another fork (go left) past 4 cattle guards, then finally across Burro Creek (mostly

dry). As we came out of the creek, there was a 'Clay Hills Restoration' area sign and an area on the left which was an abundant agate area with some diggings. Further up and around the bend is another much larger area to the right of beautiful brachiated jasper agate of tan and multi pastelite colors continuing up and becoming more colorful as you walked further away from the road.

Saturday, our journey took a different turn, turning right @ the 2nd fork, a sharp turn up away from the creek......past the Bentonite mine (on the right), which was not active and had abundant salicious material (waste) from altered volcanic ash turned into clay. Further down the road we turned right into a dry gully away from the road into an area with abundant calcedony lace jasper agate. We had 10 vehicles and 15 people present in a challenging route of dry washes. Again, next stop further down the dirt road following Burro Creek; we came to an area where the Lavender agate has been found. My second visit and a vigorous search by all availed little but finally 15 feet from the road, a small nodule poking through the dirt revealed a large agate filled rock with lavender presence. Alva noted that lower area probably held many similar lavender agates covered with sediment up ahead. On the way back we became busy at a creek crossing with silica calcedony agate grey and white. A large 600 # protruding agatey rock became the focus of our 'rock team' for removal....with Virgil and Val determined to knock this piece out of its bedrock....we were successful....a great team effort... this is the same 'rhino horn' we tried to get out in March ...amazing !!! Unfortunately Val needed a rescue as her truck got stuck in a large rut, thanks to Michael (QR&M club) and some fellow 4byers.

Sunday.... Michael led a group out toward the Baghdad mine (airport view is an amazing view of the pit) area looking for bumpy jasper and dendritic agate. Two special stop for petro glyphs, and an unusual Sa-
