Searcher Presenters and News

May Speaker: Dr. William Gelnaw



Paleontology Curator | John D. Cooper Laboratory

TOPIC: Orange County Paleontology

Orange County is home to a rich fossil record spanning the last 140 million years, from the Jurassic Bedford Canyon Group to Pleistocene beach terraces. Thanks to environmental mitigation programs, hundreds of thousands of fossils have been recovered from development projects throughout the County, most of which have been deposited at a repository operated by OC



Parks. Paleontology Curator, William Gelnaw, will provide an overview of the geological changes that have shaped our landscape, highlight significant fossils from the collection, and discuss how the public can get involved.

Dr. Will Gelnaw grew up in Orange County as an avid rock and fossil collector. After a career in paleontology that has taken him to jobs and universities all over the USA, Canada, and Australia, he landed his dream job of curating the collection where he volunteered as a kid. He is now the Paleontology Curator for OC Parks, at the John D. Cooper Laboratory.

Presentation:

The presentation was by Joseph W. Wright about Afton Canyon. Joseph posts videos on UTube about hiking and geology. He teaches geology and geography at Mount San Jacinto College.

Afton Canyon is part of the Lake Mannix complex that was formed during the Pleistocene and was 90 square miles 25,000 - 30,000 years ago. There were people along its shoreline and there were first traps, built at the edges. Fossils of western camels, short faces bears, mammoths and sloths have been found near Calico and other areas in the vicinity. Near Silver Lake you can see the ancient shoreline.

There are lake deposits in Afton Canyon that include tufa remnants. There is evidence of geothermal activity in the walls of the canyon. There is basalt at the top of the canyon and fossil cat tails in dolomite in the canyon. Blue quarts, jasper and calcite can be found as well.


LAVIC SIDING FIELD TRIP – May 13-14, 2023

After the Annual Show we schedule an "easy-ish" field trip for those who are new to the club and/or field trips and wants to see what it's all about. Mostly we will be driving on hard-packed dirt roads and cars with higher clearance will be fine. The area we explore will be Lavic Siding, and old railroad siding that's still in use. If you ask any rockhound where the Mojave's most colorful jasper can be found, Lavic Siding will be on the short list. For decades, rockhounds have driven across the tracks and down the Lavic Lake road to access this remarkable location. Red, yellow and orange jasper with blue and white quartz stringers are still found in profusion as float in this spot. Bring rock hammers and spray bottles. Our plan is to spend Saturday morning and early afternoon roaming the little mesas and gullies to the east of the brooding Pisgah Cinder Cone, and then move further south to explore the north part of Lavic Lake and check out the limits to the Testing Range boundary. Camping will be Dry Camping (Boondocking), or you can stay in Barstow or even drive up for a day trip on Saturday. That means no facilities, you need to bring it all with you and pack out any trash. Even though it shouldn't be as hot as full summer, bring at least a gallon of water per person — even the wee folks. We will have a potluck on Saturday night, but if you aren't able to contribute, don't worry, there'll be plenty.

For those who are GPS-enabled we will be at or near 34°43'23.7"N 116°17'55.4"W (34.723250,- 116.298722) and there will be Searcher Signs to the camp from the Lavic turnoff.

April 8-9, 2023






