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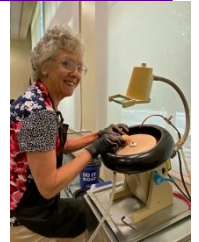

Hobby gem and mineral collectors are drawn to the Clear Creek areas by the presence of over 150 semi-precious mineral and gemstones. This is one of the most highly mineralized areas in California. The serpentine mass contains two superfund sites, Atlas Mine and Johns-Mansville. Both were associated with the mining and processing of chrysotile asbestos. Other minerals mined from the serpentine mass included cinnabar, chromite, magnesite, and jadeite. The Gem mine (private: <https://benitoitemining.com/>) located within the serpentine mass is the only source of gem-grade benitoite in the world. They have a fee dig in the tailings on the road up to our camping area if you are interested, but we will not be going on that trip. The rare minerals neptunite and joaquinite have also been found there. Other cool things to hound are jaspers, uvarovite, and plasma agate. We'll do a combination of digging for plasma agate and scouring the stream beds for interesting finds. You can't be disappointed in such a geologically diverse place!

**Please RSVP by 5/30 if you plan to attend, so we can try and get campsites for all. Also, let us know if you need a 4x4 ride.**



**Permits Needed!!**

Get your permits ahead of time by visiting the following site, each car needs a general access permit to CCMA (\$11) (1/week) AND a special permit for the Serpentine Area(ACEC) (1/day). <https://www.recreation.gov/vehiclepermits/250848>

\$11 for the CCMA and reservation fee plus a fee of \$6.00(x2) for the ACEC. So, your total fees for 2 days will be \$23.

We will also need a gate code; we will send that information out before the trip.

Directions:

I recommend using the “download offline maps” feature for Google Maps or your own selection of GPS App which allows off grid maps. There isn’t much for cell service in the area.

From the I-5 Freeway: Take exit 325 for Jayne Ave (Rt33) and go west toward Coalinga (top up fuel here as there are no more stations). Continue on Jayne Ave, which is renamed Polk St. inside the town of Coalinga, then back into Jayne Ave after passing thru town. Continue on Jayne Ave and it makes a big right (north) sweeping turn, becoming S. Derrick Ave and you are in the middle of the Chevron Oil Field, go ~4 miles.

Turn left onto Los Gatos Creek Rd. Follow for 21.5 miles, turns into Coalinga Rd at the Condon Peak Recreation Area. Continue another 8.6 miles and turn right on to Clear Creek Rd (LOOK FOR SEARCHERS SIGN). Pass over the shallow ford in the San Benito River. Travel about 2.3 miles, turn left just before the locked gate to head up to Jade Mill Campground (36.368356, -120.754140), SEARCHERS signs will be posted.

Camp is approximately 6 hrs from Orange County. The camp is a dry camp with a pit toilet, bring everything you need. The campsites in Jade Mill are under mature oak trees and suitable for RV, trailers and tents.

The closest motels are in Coalinga and King City, both of which are about an hour from the campsite.

Tools:

You may want heavy tools for the Plasma Agate, as some of it is in boulders you will need to break up if you want to take some. For the stream collecting, a rock pick and spray bottle will suffice. There are trace amounts of mercury, asbestos and arsenic as you read to get your permits. Having a filter mask is not a bad idea.

Vehicles: Although we will be on dirt roads, a high clearance vehicle or 4x4 is still recommended. If you come to camp in a car, we will have you carpool with someone for the collecting.

Potluck: On Saturday night we will have our standard potluck, bring something to share if you wish to participate. If campfires are allowed in June please bring some firewood if you are able.

NOTE:

The latest road report from Clear Creek indicates that the road to the Jade Mill campground had been graded by the BLM, and should be passable for all vehicles including RVs. The creek is also passable and should be lower still by the trip. So for now the trip is again a GO! If things change we will let you know.

## Lavic Field Trip Report

Our May 16<sup>th</sup> Field Trip to Lavic Siding was originally planned as a 1 day trip whose primary mission was to introduce new members to rock hunting. But Lavic Siding is a great area to hunt so it brought lots of long-time members, too. We had a total of 21 people on this trip! 12 were new members, 3 of which were children, and 9 long-term members. Of that, we had 9 campers who arrived on Friday and stayed until Sunday. A great turn-out for a memorable trip. It wasn't too hot for a mid-May trip, but the wind was blowing hard all day long. On the ridge tops you had to lean into it and keep one hand on your hat.

We had 4 stops on Saturday. The first 2 on the south side of the 40 yielded lots of red and yellow jasper, along with some quartz and chalcedony. The 3<sup>rd</sup> was on the north side and near an abandoned mine and had wide variety of minerals in the tailings. Lastly, we crossed the 40 again to the south and went to the Hector Hills. This area had lot of quartz and chalcedony.

It was getting close to 4pm so we called it a day with the campers going back to the camp site and the rest driving home.

## The Big Bear Quest For Big Gold

Soda? Check. Water? Check. Chimichangas? Check. Doritos—the nacho cheese ones, of course! Check. And finally, the important one: Peeps marshmallow treats. Double check! I stuffed everything into a big brown paper bag and let out a huge sigh of relief. My part of the trip prep was finally done; packing the snacks is the most important job anyway. If we ran out of food in the woods, it would be a total disaster, and I wasn't about to let that happen on my watch.

We were getting ready to go on along gold hunting trip with the Route 66 Gold Miners to their claim near Big Bear Lake. Big Bear is nowhere near Route 66. It's not even close. But I guess people will travel to crazy distant lands just for a chance to find gold. My dad says you have to go where the rocks are, not where it's convenient to park. I've learned that when you're going on a big mission like this, the preparation is the part that makes or breaks you. If you forget your shovel—or your Peeps—you're basically doomed.

I knew I had to pack my heavy clothes because the weather report said it was 35 degrees at the Serrano Campground right on the shore of Big Bear Lake. 35 degrees is basically freezing! When we got there, the lake was surrounded by all these tall pine trees, which looked cool, but man, it was chilly. We had to dress in 4 layers of clothes just to stay warm while we waited for the rest of the group to show up. I figured that because it was so cold and miserable out there, maybe only two or three people would actually show up. I mean, who wants to dig in the dirt when it's freezing?

I was totally wrong. Within a few minutes, eight mini pickup trucks came zooming into the camp. They were packed to the brim with all kinds of crazy prospecting supplies. Our trip leader was super nice and the nicest part was he brought a giant box of fresh donuts. Everyone dug in immediately. When it's so cold outside, you need calories (donut energy) to prevent yourself from freezing.

After everyone had arrived and finished introductions, we all hopped back into our cars and started a big caravan. We drove down Shoreline Drive and then turned onto a dusty dirt road. The road wasn't too bumpy, but it was very curvy and slow. It took us 45 minutes just to get to the actual claim! I kept looking out the window for claim markers like the ones you see in the desert, but I didn't see any. With all the giant pine trees and the roads twisting around like spaghetti, I bet it's really hard to make sure you aren't "claim jumping" on someone else's spot. That's a big no-no in the gold world.

Once we parked, I realized gold prospecting is actually really serious business. It's not just a guy with a pan and a donkey like in the cartoons. Everyone knew exactly what to do. They started lugging huge crates and heavy boxes to their "honey holes" (that's what they call a good digging spot). Suddenly, the quiet woods were full of pumps, loud generators, power banks, leaf blowers, dry washers and high bankers. It looked like a construction site! I figured with all that high-tech gear, we were going to find a gold quick.

But then, everyone started "tempering my expectations." That basically means they told me not to get too excited. They kept saying that nobody actually gets rich searching for gold these days. They told me we were just "reliving the history of the California gold rush" but with modern tools. It sounded a little less exciting than becoming a billionaire, but still pretty cool.

Since I'm getting bigger and stronger now, I tried not to just sit around. I helped out wherever I could. I spent a lot of time shoveling dirt into buckets and hauling 5-gallon buckets of water over to the sluice pumps. It was a workout! Usually, when you read about sluice boxes, they are in a river. But there is zero water in this area. We had to haul every single drop of water ourselves to make the machines work. We used a pump to "recirculate" the water, which means the same water keeps going through the machine over and over while it washes the gold out of the dirt.

Some people didn't want to mess with water at all, so they used "dry washers." Those are crazy because they use a leaf blower to blow the light dirt away and leave the heavy gold behind. It's super dusty and loud, but it works! The gold flakes get captured in fine carpet with riffles at the bottom of the machine. At the end of the session, you rinse the carpet into a bucket and pan it out with more precious water.. We did a "carpet-cleanup" at lunch and another one in the late afternoon. I could hardly wait for the rinse—it's the most exciting part!

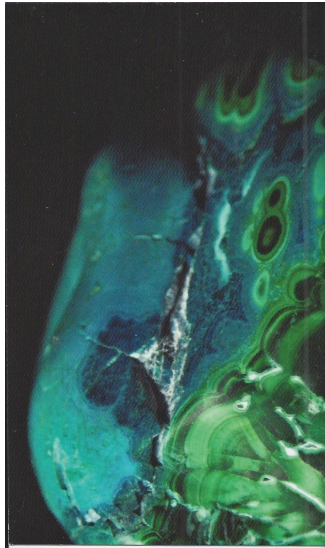
By lunchtime, we were really hungry. Our leader cooked up hot dogs, and we shared our chimichangas and potato salad. Everyone else brought different side dishes, and it was like a huge forest Thanksgiving. Everyone was tired from digging and hauling water all morning, so we didn't rush our lunch. I just sat there eating my snacks and trying to listen to the older guys talk so I could learn their secrets.

After lunch, everyone moved their gear to new spots. Some people had found enough gold (or were just tired) and went home. The rest of us moved to where the gold was found in the morning. The people who were already there were really nice and showed us exactly where to dig. They told us to go about 12 inches deep and look near big rocks because gold likes to hide behind them. I was surprised when I realized that nobody was being protective of their spots and that there were no "secret" spots. Maybe I watch too many western movies where the grizzled prospector defends his claim with a shotgun. Everyone in our group just wanted to make sure everybody got something.

After a whole afternoon of digging, sifting, and panning, we finally called it a day. Our total "take" for the whole day was about seven tiny flakes of gold. If we tried to sell it, it would be worth less than ten cents. My Doritos cost way more than that! But I learned something more important than how much gold is worth in money. We got to feel what it was like for the 49ers at Sutter's Mill. We felt the "highs" when we saw a yellow speck and the "lows" when the pan only contained black sand. I learned that if you prepare right and work hard with your friends, you can pretty much create your own paradise anywhere.

We didn't get rich last weekend, but the stuff I learned was worth way more than ten cents. I'm definitely going to have some "tall tales" to tell my friends at school, and I have awesome memories that I'm going to keep forever. Best of all, I still have a few Peeps left for next trip!

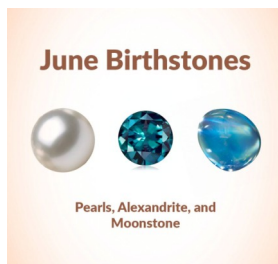
