APACHE TEARS

When lava from erupting volcanoes cools so quickly that it never crystallizes, it results in the formation of the relatively rare, glassy mineral called obsidian. Most obsidian is gray to black and can be streaked in such a way as to reflect light with a subtle iridescence. Sometimes cracks develop in obsidian and, when it is subjected to the forces of erosion, rounded, glassy pebbles are freed. They are often translucent and can be light and smoky or quite black-appearing. These pebbles are known as "Apache tears".

Obsidian, which is found along the western U.S. volcanic belt and into Mexico, was valued by the American Indians, the Aztecs, and Mayans for tools and decorative objects. In composition, it is high in silica.

AKEBITE

I have been spending a lot of time out in the Great which have been snakes. To date, all have been of the harmless you or that big ole rattler can't get away from each other gracefully and one of you gets bit: probably you. I have been reading night; maybe she can shed some light on this. a lot of stuff on the internet about this and decided to share a couple of results:

Alan Wilkins writes (by the way, he is a member of a CFMS club, can't recall which one, and provided this through an on-line field trip group):

After my post yesterday, I went home and consulted my "bible" of Wilderness Medicine, The Field Guide to Wilderness Medicine, by Paul Auerbach, Howard Donner, and Eric Weiss, technique I described briefly yesterday has been used to treat Australian elapid (a very poisonous species) bites, they stop short of recommending it for routine use because of its theoretical disadvantage of increasing local tissue damage because of the necrotizing [death of surface tissue] effect of the venom remaining localized to certain sites over time. Thus, it theoretically could sacrifice an extremity to save a life; if you're dealing with a relatively less member wrote: venomous snake, this might not be the best course of action. Their recommendations for the field management of snakebites:

- (1) Avoid panic. Instruct the victim to back out of the snake's striking range, approximately the length of the snake (personally, if I'm the victim, I'd prefer a bit more of a margin of safety than that!).
- (2) If the snake has been killed, transport it with the victim for identification purposes. Remember, though, that decapisevered head of a snake can envenomate (poison) a person.
- (3) Immobilize the extremity by splinting, as for a fracture. Do not release the bandaging until the victim receives proper medical attention, or after 24 hours have elapsed. Check pulses in the bitten extremity frequently to ensure that swelling under the bandage has not compromised the arterial circulation, a condition known as "compartment syndrome," which may threaten the viability of the extremity.
- (4) Arrange for transport to the nearest medical facility, with minimal exertion by the victim.
- (5) Encourage the victim to drink fluids to maintain hydration.
- term "controversial," representing a conscious decision to sacrifice a limb to save a life. A lympho-occlusive (lighter-pressure) constriction band applied above the extremity bite site may be beneficial, as long as arterial circulation is not compromised.

- (7) The classic recommendation to incise and suck the Plains, the Great Basin and the desert mostly tent camping and wound is also "controversial." A negative-pressure device called hiking and have met up with some interesting critters, among "The Extractor" by Sawyer Products can remove a clinically significant amount of venom if applied over the bite site within 3 variety, and just as reluctant to make my acquaintance as I was minutes and left in place for 30 minutes.  - (8) Electroshock therapy has no value and can be injurious. Best to avoid trauma to envenomated tissues to whatever extent possible.
 - (9) Cryotherapy (freezing) is not recommended because vasoconstriction (shrinking the superficial arteries) already compromised tissues can worsen tissue necrosis.
 - (10) Use of antivenin in the field is unwise, given the extensive equipment and drugs needed, and the possibility of lifethreatening allergic reactions such as anaphylaxis.
- (11) Administer an oral antibiotic targeted at "skin bactewhich I keep in my backpack. Though the pressure immobilization ria" such as Staph and Strep: Cephalexin (Keflex) or Dicloxacillin (Diclox) 250-500 mg 4 times daily for 7-10 days are the best choices.
 - (12) Immobilize the bitten extremity in a functional position within a well-padded splint.-AL

I've been told to relax and reduce the blood flow to the area of the bite to reduce spread of venom through the rest of the body.

Rattler bites rarely kill adult victims over 150 pounds who are in good health. Nerve and tissue damage can be severe. The best plan is to get to where anti-venom is available as fast as you can.

If you are under 150 pounds, have allergies, asthma, heart probtated head reactions persist for 20-60 minutes, and that even the lems, liver illness, the list goes on and on...., you may not survive a rattler bite.

> Some rattlers just bite and not inject. mature rattlers can hold their poison and save it for something they can eat. Drops will get through, but the dosage is lessened.

> It is also said that baby rattlers have a stronger venom for self protection, but this may be because they cannot control their "load" and give it all to you.

> If the rattler just ate, the venom is low and they have little to inject into you.

(6) Application of an arterial-occlusive tourniquet they I would suggest finding some antivenin quickly. There is little value in tourniquets or cutting the wound and sucking. You can try them but there is probably little value. Best is to lay down, calm down and hope

Scheffler's Geode Mine near Keokuk is a fee area where for \$10 one can collect 50 pounds of geodes. That is cheap enough, but the downside is that the geodes have to be chiseled out of a tough shale. Normally shale is brittle but this wasn't, and a chisel was the only tool that worked in getting the geode out. Because the matrix was so tough some of the geodes were broken during the chiseling process. You can see them in the picture.

Jacque and I also traveled through Missouri so I did collect some Mozarkite, which is a type of colorful flint.

Currently we are near the Black Hills of South Dakota, and I have been looking for Fairburn agates in the grasslands. I have found some prairie agates, but no Fairburn yet. I'll keep looking.
