

See you all in April and at the Show in May.





The Buena Vista Museum of Natural History would like to invite you to our Guest Speaker Program: March 25th at 2 P.M.. The topic will be Sharks.

Also on 04/01, The Bureau of Land Management and the Buena Vista Museum Field Trip: Santa Maria Basin - Point Sal. The ecology, history and geology of the Santa Maria area is considered with stops at Point Sal and Vandenburgh Air Force Base., Plate tectonics, continental accretion and shoreline processes are topics of discussion. April 9 to 16, 2000

Studies will include the lapidary arts: bead stringing, soft stone carving, studying fossils, cabochon making, silver smiting and wire wrap. Field trips will be conducted for sightseeing and collecting. Lectures and programs will complete the evening.

Three meals will be provided daily, and field trip food will be included. There are adequate accommodations, and the bathroom is located nearby in a separate building.

Parking is available for RVs.



I've been 4x4ing the web in search of trips any rockhound might like to sink their pick into. We'll continue to build our field trip calendar as additional outings become available. As indicated, not all trips listed are under the authority of CFMS/Searchers. All members are allowed to attend the Youth Group outings; but adult attendees are requested to provide assistance to the group as a whole, allowing Norbert the opportunity to maximize his time spend with our Rock'n Kids.

Not many trips are scheduled during the summer months and I encourage those with knowledge of digsites along the coast, or west of the mountains, to share your experience and organize a day or weekend field trip. We really need the expert assistance of our seasoned diggers to point out the digsites.

As long as we keep at least 3 wheels on the ground at all times, I understand everyone would appreciate the opportunity to attend more field trips. Richard Butler and I will gladly add them to the trip calendar and provide trip specifics to the entire membership via The Rock Slab News. Rainbow Ridge Opal Mine

May 27 to 29, 2000

Lana Brown and our Placerville CFMS affiliated group, are arranging a trip to the Rainbow Ridge Opal Mine May 27-29, 2000 (and a few are remaining the entire week). This is an exceptional trip to obtain some of the most beautiful wood cast opals in the world.

Tailings are provided to our group at a discounted rate of \$25/day. Children aged 10-15 years are half price, and kids under 10 dig for free when accompanied by an adult.

For \$150 you can purchase a fresh virgin ground scoop of approximately 3 yards in a loader bucket that the miners haven't gone through yet. Two people can share the scoop, and it will take you the full day from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM to sift through it. A new-comer struck the mother lode in a fresh scoop—finding an opal the mine owner offered him \$125,000 for on the spot—he refused to sell!

The mine, and many of the repeat participants and jewelers, will instruct you in some of the techniques to help spot opals with an 'educated' eye. You just sift through the clay tailings. Bring a small garden rake, trowel or small shovel, spray bottle with water, bucket for wood pieces, sun block, hat and gloves. The rock shop sells beautiful opal as rock and jewelry.

The opal mine is located in Virgin Valley, NV, in Northwest Nevada, approximately 135 miles from Winnemucca, NV and 1000 miles from Lakeview, OR. The closest town is Denio, NV, 35 miles away. All roads are blacktop except for the last 7.5 miles which are gravel and dirt. Trailers should be left at the CCC camp 5 miles before the mine, and the last couple of miles should not be attempted at all during wet weather. There is no overnight camping at the ridge, but there is camping available close by:






The California Federation of Mineralogical Societies (CFMS) is coordinating a trip to Stone Canyon, on Saturday, May 13, 2000. All inquiries can be addressed to Steve Ivie, CFMS Field Trip Chairman - South, 805/376-2340 / irockhound@aol.com.

Meet in Parkfield, near the town of San Miguel, at 9:00 AM prompt. Take I-5 or Hwy 101 north. Make sure you have gas, and food, before leaving the freeway area. We'll be traveling into a cow pasture so please drive an appropriate vehicle. A 4x4 will NOT make it through the pasture if it rains.

The owner will provide 50 pounds of material for \$25.00, after that material is 50 cents per pound—cash only. The jasper material is quoted to be of the highest quality. Jasper is sharp—wear good gloves and safety glasses, long sleeves are optional, long pants, and field collecting boots are recommended. Bring standard collecting tools; a sledge hammer, chisel and heavy buckets if you have them.

Story has it that large equipment was brought in last year and a giant piece of jasper was brought to the surface—you just have to whack your pieces off—no digging! Additionally, a guy nearly bottomed out his heavy-duty 3/4 ton truck when a giant piece was placed in the bed. He had a heck of a time getting it out of his truck and left it in the city park in Parkfield where you can whack pieces off of it! I guess if we can't make it through the pasture, we should meet at the Park!

CFMS affiliated members and guests can attend who abide by the AFMS Code of Ethics.



Peterson Mountain and Hallelujah Mining and Exploration Site

May 27 to 29, 2000

MSSC is organizing the 6th annual trip to the Petersen Mountain and Hallelujah Mining and Exploration site, May 27-29, 2000, to dig for quartz, quartzscepters and amethyst. The mine owners reserve the right to keep one specimen per day (which hasn't happened yet) but if they do, they will pay the finder \$200. The mine owners will be hosting a BBQ on Sunday night and all are invited.

RVs are O.K., or stay in Reno. It's the holiday weekend, so make reservations in advance. Visit the web page at http://www.mineralsocal.org/bulletin/2000_mar.htm for pictures of past field trips, a specimen photo, and the application to attend. They can only accommodate 25 people per day, so complete and return the registration form, with your check, by May 1, 2000 (first comefirst serve). Any vehicle can get to the campsite, but you must have a 4x4 to get to the claim. They will caravan to the collecting site and be on site from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM daily. Be there early to register. You must come to the campsite to dig with the group.


From Reno, take US 395 North, 30 miles, to Hallelujah Junction (gas & food), and then 10 miles more to Red Rock Road. Turn right and go about a mile. The campsite is on the right. Look for the MSSC sign. DO NOT drive over the speed-limit between Reno and Red Rock Road as it is a high enforcement zone for NHP and CHP.

Camping With Connie Van Kampen

At age 5, I picked up my first rock on top of a hill in the Twin Peaks district of San Francisco. I admired its beauty and found that it was agate, just like the marbles I had won and collected through my youth. Years later to the present, I have been teaching geology, fauna, flora and history in 'Exploring Southwest Deserts' for 17 years, and it has been truly gratifying. If you are adventurous, enjoy camping and meeting nice people, this class is for you! I also teach a Kids' College 'Science Safari' class. Students enjoy hands-on projects and nature hikes in our local hills. I am currently employed with 'Science on the Go,' and enjoy my participation in the Searcher's Gem and Mineral Society.

Exploring Southwest Deserts courses are offered through the North Orange County Community College District (NOCCC) on a non-credited basis. Trips are held monthly, usually over the weekend, except during the summer semester when a week-long trip is offered. A course catalog may be obtained from the school district (including Yorba Linda and Cypress College), or viewed online at www.sce.cc.ca.us, under the Science and Discovery class schedule. Student enthusiasm is evident at their website under construction at www.netwisedesign.com/vankampers.

The class utilizes CBs while traversing the landscape, educational handouts are provided, and often tours are lead by local experts. We enjoy many learning experiences regarding the interactions of geology, plants and animals, rockhound, take numerous optional hikes, share a gourmet potluck dinner around a campfire on Saturday night, and have established long-term friendships. A nominal tuition is charged for each class; children are free. Unless you make other arrangements with me, you must attend the class orientation (usually held on the Monday before the trip) at the Yorba Linda Continuing Education Center, 4175 Fairmont, Yorba Linda, CA, Room 303, at 7:00 PM.

If you need help or have a problem, or want to volunteer to help, please let me, Larry Richey, or George Lux know what you can do to help. This is for your safety and protection.


NAME BADGES



Rockhounds' Code of Ethics

I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without the owner's permission.

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas,

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind: fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires in designated or safe places only, and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material: matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.*

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.


I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with fieldtrip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management, or other authorities any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public, educational, and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources. I will observe the 'Golden Rule,' will use 'good outdoor manners,; and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and public 'image' of rockhounds everywhere.

* Note: a recent mandate has been made to assist in the protection of the endangered desert turtle. Dig sites left unfilled should have an incline with no more than a 30% grade to allow turtles to exit the hole.



THE DEATH ROUTE

They sat and stood around the fire, and by its light the thoughtful faces of the older men told of the importance of the decision, which must be made

During the past week, rumors had come back about the line of wagons, about a new trail which offered not only a shorter distance to the valleys of California but would bypass the dreaded Forty Mile Desert. They had come to this point this afternoon. The deeper ruts were heading south toward the Humbolt River, and the newer ruts heading west towards the unknown.

The older men were undecided and cautious. They had examined the tracks and had pointed out that for every wagon that had taken the new trail, hundreds had followed the old one. Would it be wiser and safer to stay on the established route? That was the decision that they would have to make.

The young men, welcoming a gamble which might save weeks, argued that it was late in the year and had pointed out what had happened to the Dinner party a year before when almost all of them perished on the mountain.

The fire had burned the last of its fuel before the decision was made. The next day, the wagons would head west to follow a trail that was destined to become known as 'The Death Route.' The year was 1849.

It is not possible that one person alone was responsible for the misinformation which caused the 1849 disaster, but many historical accounts credit Peter Lesson with such an achievement. Lesson, was born in Denmark and migrated to the U.S. In 1843, he received a land grant in the Sacramento Valley. Hoping to bring emigrants to his ranch, he went east and acted as a guide to hopefully bring people west to settle on his land. This was in 1847-48. He new of the Applegate Trail but had blazed a trail through the Black Rock that would lead others to follow that were not as fortunate as he was. Now back to the original story.

From Lessons boasting of the shorter route, this next party would try and follow his route. That was a mistake. Alonzo Delano a writer with the ill-fated wagon train would document the things that happened next. The Party had started from Lessons Meadows. This is in the middle of the desert. From there it was another 40 miles to Rabbit Hole Springs, which had the promise of water, if it hadn't dried up. Sure enough, when they hit rabbit hole, there was only a few sips left for the people. The animals had nothing to drink. The Party left Rabbit Hole Springs "with anxious hearts" and a reality that they were really in trouble." As I walked on slowly and with effort, I encountered a great many animals perishing for want of food and water. Some would be gasping for breath; others unable to stand would issue low moans as I came upon them. Showing intense agony, the poor horse or oxen would stagger along side of me with a low sound as if begging for a drop of water. I was helpless, for I myself was in need of that precious drink of water. "I was now on the forbidding Black Rock, there was no turning back. I had secured a little water from Rabbit Hole in a rubber flask that was made in India and was saving it for an emergency. Never did I realize that what lay ahead of me would test my love for my fellow man. I came upon a wagon. Seated in the wagon was a young woman with a small child. The little boy was crying for water. The poor mother with tears running down her cheeks was trying to pacify the little sufferer. "Where is your husband, I enquired?" He has gone on with the cattle in search of water, but I think we will all die before he returns. My son and I have not seen a drop of water in days. I think we will die before he returns. I cannot endure it much longer." "Keep up a stout heart. I have a little water left, and you are welcome to it." "God bless you-God bless you," she said, gasping the flask eagerly. (This is where we all can see that the love that this woman had for her child would be the greatest love of all. Putting him first.) "Here, my child, here is water. The gift of life is now in your hands. Thanks to this kind man who has given us his last drink of water." (In the story, you can see how each one put the other ahead of them) I live by what I call Bob's commandment to himself. God First. His fellow man second. This includes his wife and children and the people that need help in this world. Then I can look at myself and say that Bob has lived his life like the people in the story. Putting them ahead of himself. Now I am at piece with my God and myself.

Before she had tasted a drop, she gave it all to her child which was a little more than a teacup. Even in distress and misery, a mother's love is for her children, rather than herself. This all happened in 1849. What has happened to morals that they had then. "Where have all the flowers gone, gone to graveyards everyone." That is a song of the sixties that may say how we have changed our way of thinking. Let us all think of the story and get to know it's meaning. We all should be concerned for one another and learn to live in this world and to learn to help one another when someone is in need. Maybe one day, we will be that person that is reaching for the cup of water and we can say, "God bless you and thank you for your kindness."


