



November Field Trip Super Chili Cookoff Rules/Judging Groundrules

1) The chili may contain beans and/or meat.

2) The chili must be more than just a canned product. This means that it must contain a atleast one other ingredient if you use only a canned product.

3) The chili must be identified by a specific name.

4) The chili must be accompanied by a list of the ingredients.

Procedures

1) Entries will be judged by 5 Searchers and/or guests randomly selected by 2nd VP.

2) Each chili entry will be placed into five small cups to be judged.

3) Each entry must have a unique name.

4) All entrees will be unmarked except for a number on the 5 cups.

5) No entrant names will be released until the winner has been announced.

6) Three criteria will be used to judge the chili; the chili name, taste and texture.

7) Any type of beans or meat may be used just as long as it's fit for human consumption. This means no pack mule or coyote or frog legs please.

What is the WRA?

Maybe you've heard the name before but didnt know exactly what it is that they do. Well, I asked Frank Davis to check it out at Boron where the World Rockhounds Association met on October 11-13, 1991. Here is a brief summary of how our contributions are used. The WRA is a powerful lobbying group whose purpose is to keep public lands open to multiple uses such as rockhounding. It has many very influential Senators and Governors as spokesman as well as its own professional lobbyist on staff in Washington DC. Frank said that he was told that on one occassion the WRA flew Mayor, now Governor, Pete Wilson to Boron to have him personally see the area and to view for himself the lack of destruction on the part of rockhounds. They even chartered a helicopter tour to show him that there were no new roads created nor mass destruction caused by rockhounds. He later flew to Washington DC to speak out to defeat a public land bill. The WRA, like the Searchers, and the CFMS and AFMS is comprised mainly of older members and could use some new blood. All rockhounds should take a more active role in these organizations or else we may one day find ourselves herded like cattle into a pen called L.A. and be unable to collect rocks, minerals, gemstones, or fossils on our own. If you want to let your kids or grandkids see how rocks and minerals are actually found in place then these organizations need your help. If you choose not to help then you may as well start driving to county and state museums to view mineral displays since this will most likely be all the enjoyment that you will be afforded in the future.

November 28-31, 1991 Field Trip Tecopa Hot Springs/Kingston Peak

Directions: The total driving time to the camping area is about 5 hours. Follow IS15 north towards Las Vegas. Exit the freeway at Cima Road and go north for 29 miles. Note Cima Road goes south and north it turns into Excelsior Road. Camp anywhere flat. The DV ranger said there were plenty of flat spots for RV's there. The collecting sites are adjacent to the camp area and more within 10 miles with the exception of the Toltec Mine and Apache Canyon Mines. From base camp to Tecopa Hot Springs is 25 miles on a good graded road. From base camp to Death Valley Junction is about 60 miles. On Thursday we will have the traditional potluck turkey dinner between 2 and 4 pm. On Friday we will have a potluck pancake breakfast. Bring stoves, batter, bacon, sausage, syrup, etc... for breakfast. Saturday evening will mark the Super Chili Cookoff - snake, armadillo, chicken, whatever you want goes. No rules except it has to be hot and/or different from canned chili. Judges will be appointed on site to determine 1st, 2nd and 3rd place with certificates and prizes. Other sites of interest are the Death Valley Playhouse and Tecopa Hot Springs for visiting of your own free will.

What to bring: <u>Water, firewood, food, flashlights, hard rock tools. Dry camp.</u> Supplies in Tecopa, Baker and Cima Road exit. What to collect: Quartz, amethyst, opal, agate, chalcedony roses, iron, onyx, turquoise nuggets and chips
