SHOP HINT: One way to clean quartz and amethyst crystals is to cover them with fresh vinegar to remove carbonates such as calcite, barite and lime. Allow to stand overnight. Repeat if necessary, wash well, and place crystals in washing type amonia for 8-12 hours. Remove, rinse, and wipe dry.

Perceived Goals for OCGMC

- Identify, and where possible, patent claims in Orange County or have them donated to the OCGMC to preserve collecting sites within Orange County.
- Obtain commitments from various clubs/members for loans and/or donations of mineral specimens to the Orange County Museum of Natural History.
- Create an intercounty field trip and contact guide for each county site.
- 4. Form an alliance with the Micromounters for access to their sites and contacts.
- 5. Determine the funding level necessary for annual commitments and publishing costs.
- 6. Contact San Diego Co.Council, Los Angeles Co.Council, Ventura Co.Council, San Bernardino Co.Council, Inyo Co.Council, Kern Co.Council, etc...regarding collecting localities and accessibility.
- Determine the scope and breadth of the functions to be performed by the OCCMC.
- 8. Create a video presentation regarding rock and mineral collecting and seek free time on public television.

 Cover all facets of lapidary and collecting, field trips, etc... and end with a listing of local clubs and contacts for additional information. Make video appeal to geologists, earth scientists, students, teachers, etc...
- 9. Contact local universities for potential club memberships in OCGMC clubs.
- 10. Contact the AFMS and CFMS to discuss their needs at the local county level of participation.
- 11. Contact the California Mining Association regarding access to active mine site dumps by OCGMC members under the supervision of mine employees.
- 12. Arrange for waivers approved by the CMA to be used at collecting sites under the supervision of CMA members.
- 13. Create identification badges and stationary for use by OCGMC members for use in their correspondence with various organizations.

Orange County Gem and Mineral Society Report - by Walter Mroch

The meeting was held at the Orange County Fairgrounds on 9/29/90. The Searcher's in attendance were myself, Jim Williamson, Nancy Kramp, Todd Schowalter and Clare Gagnon. Other Searcher's present in other capacities were George Shepard, Conrad Cone, and Ed Zinn who were all manning the VA booth. The issues and ideas discussed at the meeting included an idea list, proposed stationary and logos submitted by myself. Some discussion was made over the logo and how it would possibly be made into a pin or sticker, about nickel-size, which would be mounted on the club badges. Nancy Kramp said that she would come up with a color scheme for the badges or stickers for the logo design presented.

Clare Gagnon indicated that the Faceter's Guild has compiled a list of speakers on lapidary topics. A suggestion was made by Todd Schowalter that each of the club delegates poll their memberships for information on old and no longer accessible collecting sites and also if there are any members who currently hold lectures or would like to give presentations to other clubs. We also discussed getting other clubs such as the 49'ers involved so that our members could attend some of their prospecting trips and they in turn could attend some of the OCGMC club meetings and functions.

Todd Schowalter said that 125 referrals for new potential club members were received at the Orange County Fair. He also said that he would like to see all of the member clubs sponsor one or two demonstration days at next year's fair. The Orange Coast Mineral Society indicated that their Baja Trip would begin October 23, 1990 thru Sunday of that week.

The next meeting of the OCGMC will be on Saturday, January 19, 1991 at 10:30AM at the Plumber's Union Hall located at 3904 W. First Street in Santa Ana. Note that this is at a show location so you wouldn't be going out of your way to attend one of the meetings. We want your input!

Only one person made any effort to learn more. The Fusco Company will not sell small amounts.



Leaving Freeport, Maine and driving South thru Kennebunkport (President Bush didn't invite us to his vacation spot). Continued through the tip of New Hampshire then into Massachusetts. This was hilly country covered with trees so youcan't see much driving down the highways.

Visited friends in Connecticut then on into New York state. Near Hyde Park we saw Franklin D. Roosevelt's home and museum. Not a real showplace but very interesting. Our next stop was Albany to visit friends and got to see the Capital and surrounding area.

It was only a short distance to Herkimer, New York. We stopped there for two days and I pounded rocks looking for Herkimer Diamonds. Found a good number of medium size. Some were loose in pockets in the rock while others were still partially attached. Bringing plenty of specimens back to show you.

Continuing West we stopped to see Niagara Falls which is spectacular. A continual cloud of mist hangs in that area because of the volume of water coming over the falls. Leaving that area we followed the highway by Lake Erie cutting through a corner of Pennsylvania. In Ohio we cut South to see several points of interest.

Our first stop was at Wrather Carvings in Dover, Ohio. Wrather was a master carver of 32-years who carved the history of locomotives in wood and ivory. His models worked as far as the wheels moving and they were done down to the minute details such as rivets in the boiler.

Our next stop was Cambridge, Ohio. Here we saw a glass factory. We were given a 30-minute film on how the glassware was formed etc. The color and shapes of the glassware was outstanding.

Continuing West we passed through Indiana and Illinois and stopped near St Louis, Missouri to see Meramec Caverns (Jesse James used the caverns as a hideout in his time). From there we continued on to Independence, Missouri where we visited the Harry Truman Museum and Library. This was interesting since he was involved in a lot of important issues during his time in office.

We are now in Kansas visiting relatives and friends before continuing West. We will try to get in some more rock collecting in Oklahoma and New Mexico. See you in November.




