



Searchers and Rock 'n' Kids Event

Our one-day field trip for May will be Memorial Day weekend, Saturday, May 25, 2002. The trip will be to the Big Bear area in the San Bernardino Mountains.

We will be going to Crystal Hill where clear crystals, some double terminated, can be found in abundance. They vary from very small to approx. 1/4 diameter x 1" long. Bring a small army shovel, rock pick, goggles, and if you can bring a sieve, that would be great! Driving time from Orange County is 2-1/2 hours.



The trail is level and an easy one-mile hike. Bring drinks, a picnic lunch, sunscreen, sunglasses, a hat and small Zip-Loc plastic bags for your treasures. From Orange County take the 91 freeway and head toward Big Bear. Takc, 330 and 18 through Running Springs.

When you get to the dam, stay to the left of the lake and head for the small village of Fawnskin. ZERO your odometer at FAWNSKIN and drive 2.8 miles to the Forest Service Discovery Center and buy your Adventure pass. You will need it in order to park at the trail head. I think the charge is \$5 per vehicle. The Discovery Center opens at 9 AM.

Continue east on Hwy. 18. You will pass a sign at 10.2 miles that says "to Victorville, Lucerne Valley" and pass the Holcomb Valley turnoff and dump. This is on the north side of the dry Baldwin Lake.

At 10.5 miles turn right on Baldwin Lake Road. This is a paved road and it will take you south along the east side of the dry lake.

At 11.7 miles turn left on Vale Road. Turn left again on the next road with Forestry Road Marker #2N02. At the indicated mileage of 12.3 miles total from Fawnskin, there is a parking area to the left and up the hill.

We will meet at this area at 9:30 AM. You will see the Pacific Crest Trail leading north. We will walk along this trail. At about a half mile there will be a hill on your right covered with white quartz. Sorry, that is not the correct place. Keep walking and you will pass through a canopy of pinyon pines.

About 75 feet into the trees you will enter a Joshua tree area; after passing the first Joshua tree, take the small trail heading to the right. You will see the white quartz area in front of you.
