GREETINGS TO THE SEARCHERS FROM MONTREAL, CANADA -

We started off July in Mankato, Minnesota in a heat wave. It was in the high 90's and then got to 102° before a cooling trend set in. Spent the 4th of July in Minneapolis - St Paul area seeing the Capital, a Science Museum and some fireworks.

Heading East we entered Wisconsin, "The Dairy State". Lots of farms in Southern part with some trees. Stayed in Eau Claire seeing some museums. Then North through Wausau and Rhinelander. Now we are in forests and rolling terrain. We entered the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and continued to the end of the neck that sticks out into Lake Superior. The lake is 200 miles long and 160 miles at widest point. Beautiful blue-green water which is cold.

Stayed about a week at Copper Harbor at the tip of the Peninsula where I was able to rock hunt for Lake Superior agate. Found some small ones on beaches and there are miles of places to hunt. Another rock found there is Datolite which looks similar to Howlite. It is stained with copper and comes out in various colors with an enamel like finish. Bringing home some specimens as well as some good Lake Superior agate I purchased.

The neck of land was found to have lots of copper. In 1834 it was the world's largest copper mining area but now mostly worked out.

From there we drove East to Munising where we took a boat ride to see the pictured rock formations. Then on to Sault Ste Marie, Michigan to see the locks between Lake Superior and Lake Huron.

Entered Canada and they also have a town called Sault Ste Marie which is larger than the U.S. side. From there we continued East to Sudbury where the world's largest nickel mine is located. Sudbury also has the world's largest smokestack, 1250 feet.

Leaving Sudbury we passed through North Bay and stopped at Ottawa. Saw the Changing of the Guard and their parliment buildings, the capital of Canada.

We are now in Montreal area, which they call the Paris of Canada. It is 2.8 million and very progressive. The country is mostly flat with few trees. Nearby is the St Lawrence waterway which goes to the Great Lakes from the Atlantic.

Next we head for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia then back into the U.S. at the Northern tip of Maine.


ICE CREAM SERVED AT -- 1:00 PM


